Deerfield Tri C to Present Play

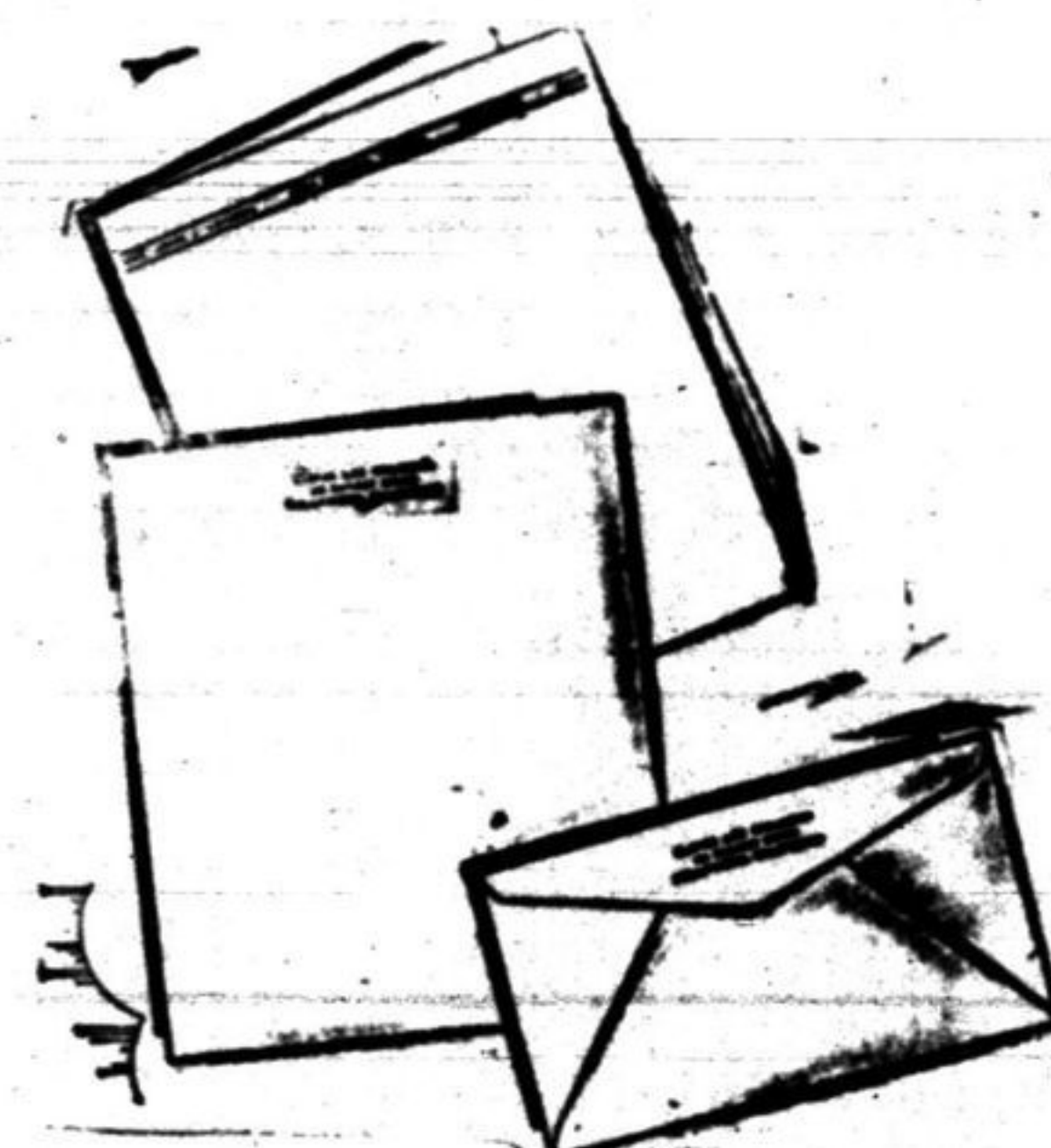
One of the outstanding public offerings for the year will be the dramatization of the play "Deacon Dubbs" by the Tri C society of St. Paul's church.
