

FRANK A. LAING, 67, DIES HERE TUESDAY

Frank A. Laing, 67, died here Tuesday morning at his home, 641 Glenview avenue, after a long illness.

Mr. Laing was born in 1868 in Artus, Dorothy Woltze, and Edward A. Laing, were born to him.

From 1914 to 1916 Mr. Laing was assessor of the city of Highland Park, and for more than 20 years assisted assessors James Haefter, James Duffy, and Ringdahl with the assessors' work. There was perhaps no one in Highland Park more familiar with the assessed real estate values in the vicinity than Frank Laing, and his passing will result in a loss to the community at large.

Mr. Laing was a highly respected citizen and his many friends will learn of his death with deep regret.

Funeral services will be held this afternoon at 2:30 p.m. from the funeral home, 641 Glenview avenue, in Lake Forest cemetery.

He is survived by his wife and three children. Mr. Laing leaves four grandchildren, Barbara and Betty Argentin, Virginia Woltze and Kathie Woltze, and the sympathy of the community.

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national and state tickets, and the Republican winners on the county ticket. Precincts 4, 5, 6, 7, and 8, out of the twelve, showed a majority of Republican national and state as well as county votes, however.

Socialist Votes
In one local precinct, there were as many Socialist as Republican votes for the two presidential candidates of those parties, with of course the Democratic candidate leading by a big majority.

Deerfield township fell in line with the total county vote in passing the \$20,000,000 bond issue for emergency relief, the gateway amendment to change the state constitution, and the proposed change in the banking laws. These three propositions carried in Lake county about 10 to 1.

The Republican winners of county offices are as follows: Dr. J. L. Taylor, coroner; Robert J. Pearsall, auditor; Lewis O. Brockway, recorder; L. J. Wilmot, circuit clerk; Charles E. Mason, state's attorney; and Charles E. Russell, surveyor. In addition, the Republican candidates for state representative, Richard J. Lyons and William M. Carroll were successful; and Ray Padlock, Republican, was elected state senator.

"Banner Republican County"
With the exception of Mr. Mason, the other county Republican candidates were running for re-election for at least their third terms. Practically no other county in Illinois has kept the same Republican officials in the same offices for as many successful terms as Lake county, long known as the "Banner Republican county."

For the first time in forty years the Democrats placed a full county ticket in the field in Lake county this year. The last Democratic official elected by Lake county was Sheriff A. F. Conrad, who was elected in 1892.

It also gives interested mothers an opportunity to find out just what the Brownie daughter is doing. The course is open to any adult.

SWIMMING
Swimming as usual each Saturday morning at the high school tank. Competent life savers and instructors are in attendance each Saturday morning. Below are the requirements for the life saver badge. (Note: Requirements for the life saver badge continue to be the same as those for the American Red Cross junior life saving award. Since the American Red Cross has revised its requirements, the new rules for the life saver badge are now as follows:

- (1) Pass the swimmer's test for American Red Cross, (a) tread water 30 seconds, (b) float motionless, (c) perform plain or racing dive, in good form, (d) swim 100 yards, using side and one other standard stroke, (e) witness demonstration of artificial respiration, (f) swim 50 feet on back using legs only, (g) recover object in 6 to 8 feet of water by means of surface dive.
- (2) Life savers must pass the following tests after at least eight hours preparation and practice: (a) In deep water, disrobe from middie blouse, skirt or bloomers and camp shoes, and swim 100 yards; (b) release double grip on one wrist, left and right; (c) release front strangle hold, left and right; (d) release back strangle hold, left and right; (e) resuscitate, 1 1/2 minutes' demonstration. Schaefer-prone pressure method, (f) surface dive in 6 to 8 feet, recovering objects 3 times, and a 10-lb. weight once, (g) correct approach, 30 feet, and head
