Al DeMeo Wins Bout at Waukegan Friday

Fighting in the semi-windup of the charity bouts held last Friday evening, Nov. 4, in the high school gym at Waukegan. Al DeMemo, of Deerfield-Shields, won a three-round event from George Madole, of Libertyville.

Just before the close of the first round, DeMemo floored Madole with a right hook to the jaw and the fight would have ended there had not the bell saved Madole. The next two rounds were close with plenty of action, but at the end of the fight it appeared that DeMemo had carried the fight throughout, and he was awarded the judges' decisions, unanimously.

Last month Al lost a decision to this same opponent because of a foul called against him. In the windup bout, George Haberski, of Waukegan, knocked out Bob Foley, of Gray's Lake, in the second round of a scheduled three round event.
