Years Ago. Moves to New Location. Brief History

Just twelve years ago, Dec. 4 1920, the Deerfield State bank was opened, and has remained in the same location until today, when its increasing business and lack of adequate space, it has been deemed wise to seek a new home.

The bank makes the following announcement:

Announcement

The Deerfield State Bank is now located in the room formerly occupied by the Citizens State bank of Deerfield.

Having combined the vault equipment of the two banks we can now supply your demand for safety deposit boxes and other modern bank facilities.

.This bank is a public institution supported by the people in its community, we trust you will ever regard it as such and permit us to serve you any way we can.

> Deerfield State Bank, Deerfield, Ill. Brief History of Bank

On July 15, 1920, a petition asking for permission to organize a bank in Deerfield was sent to Honorable Andrew Russell, auditor of Public Accounts in Springfield. This petition was signed by Peter J. Duffy, George Rockenbach, James E. O'Con. nor of Deerfield and Harry Paul of Highland Park.

In response to the application to organize, the auditor, under the date of Aug. 19, 1920, issued a permit to organize a bank to be known as "The Deerfield State Bank," with a capital stock of \$25,000. The entire stock was sold in less than twenty days to eighty-five subscribers.

The first stockholders meeting was held Sept. 2, 1920, at which the ionowing seven men were elected as directors: William Bubert, Theodore J. Knaak, L. D. Kellogg, James O'Connor, Rudolph Lauer, Harry Paul, and George Rockenbach.

The first directors meeting held six days later resulted in the following being elected: President, Harry Paul; vice president, R. L. Redheffer; cashier, Paul M. Dietz.

The bank opened for business in the Stryker building on Dec. 4, 1920. Presidents to serve are: 1920—Harry Paul; 1921-1927 - Arthur Ender; 1927-1932-Rudolph Lauer.

At the death of Mr. Paul Dietz in 1929, Mr. J. W. McGinnis succeeded him as cashier...

The annual meeting will take place in January, 1933. Present executive officers are: President, Rudolph Lauer; vice president, Elmer L. Clavey; cashier, J. W.
