## Woman Dies Here of Injuries Received When Struck by Car

Miss Wilma Breitfield, of 407 Maple avenue, Wilmette, for many years a dressmaker employed in north shore towns, died in the Highland Park hospital last Sunday of injuries received when she was struck by an automobile Saturday night at Central avenue near the railroad tracks in the business section of the city.

She was crossing the street, according to the story she told local police at the hospital before she died, and walked directly into a car driven by Maurice Diehl, of Bethlehem, Penn. Mr. Diehl and his companion, Leo St. Gorrard, took her to the hospital, where her injuries at the time were not believed to be serious. Sunday, however, she suffered an internal hemorrhage, which caused her death.

The occupants of the car were permitted to continue on their way after the accident, but will return for a coroner's inquest later. Funeral services for Miss Breitfield will be held this Saturday from the Kelly Undertaking parlors in this city, but arrangements are indefinite as we go to press.

Miss Breitfield came to America from Germany, and as far as can be learned, had no relatives in America.

Mr. St. Gorrard, a passenger in the car which struck Miss Breitfield, is a brother of the famous dog musher who carried the diphtheria anti-toxin to Nome, Alaska, several years ago. The two men here last Saturday were on their way to Canada to visit the famous dog driver.
