Highland Park's first score came as the result of a beautiful punt by Rogan which was downed by Bert Berube on the 2-yard line. Lake Forest punted out to their own 30-yard line from which point Les Allens tore right through Lake Forest's defense, making three gains of 10 yards each for a score, but Highland Park failed to add the extra point and the score was tied 6-6. Directly after the kickoff, Lake Forest made a march of 60 yards for their second score, Dickinson nabbing a pass for the touch-down. The kick for extra point was blocked, but with the score 12-6 the Lake Forest fans went crazy.

Broke the Tie

With their back to the wall and the Highland Park rooters shouting for another touchdown, the Highland Park team started a march toward the enemy goal from the 50-yard line. Bill Hammond succeeded in making three first downs and a forward pass, Horween to Parker, brought the ball to the 2-yard line. Highland Park failed to gain on two plays, but when Parker scooted around right end to cross the goal and tie the score, Highland Park fans became excited. Only when "Moon" Stipe was sent in to kick for the extra point and break the tie did the Highland Park fans go completely cuckoo.

Final score, Highland Park 13; Lake Forest 12.

Before the game and during the intermission between halves, the drum and bugle corps of the Dumaresq Spencer Post No. 145, American Legion, of Highland Park, entertained the crowd on the field.
