**\$21,000 RAISED IN  
RELIEF DRIVE HERE**

**Still \$9,000 Short of Goal After  
Campaign of Three  
Weeks**

Due to the unremitting efforts of nearly 100 men and women in behalf of the Highland Park Social Service drive, pledges received to date total somewhat in excess of \$21,000. While this is encouraging to every one who is interested in the progress of this vitally important activity, the results are still \$9,000 short of the irreducible minimum needed to help the destitute of our community to keep body and soul together during the next twelve months.

The drive is now in its third week, which is imposing an undue burden on the workers, who are giving a great part, and in some cases all, of their spare time to this cause. But they as well as the campaign committee are determined to carry the message into every home which is not in actual want, and by doing so to raise the amount so urgently needed.

There have been many touching cases of sacrificial giving, and if those very, very few who have not heeded the call could but know of the dozens of needy families who through no fault of their own, through accident or illness, are in need of help, they would do their share. To know of these cases is to grow more human,—to learn something of the real tragedies of life that may befall any one.
