TAX SALES SLOW IN LAKE COUNTY

Most of Titles Forfeited This Year; Few Bidders For Property

Instead of two or three thousand tax sales in Lake county, as was the case in more prosperous times, there have been only approximately 400 tax sales this year, netting less than \$10,000 according to County Treasurer Jay Morse.

Most of the tax titles this year were forfeited, as there were few bidders. The fact that many people during the past few years have failed to redeem tax titles has caused a falling off in the number of professional bidders.

Bids this year were received only on choice pieces of property, certain to bring quick returns for the person buying the tax title.

Cuts County Revenue

In good times in Lake county, according to Treasurer Morse, tax title sales bring the county about \$200,000. He said, however, that the general collection situation this year is much better than he first anticipated.

Final figures on the Lake county tax collections will not be available for about three weeks, but up to the present time about 79 per cent of the taxes, possibly 80 per cent, have been collected, it is said.

Collections, however, have been better in the farming sections of the county and in the residential suburbs than in the industrial area.

Tax collection in Zion and Benton township have been very slow this year, according to Mr. Morse. The North Chicago section of Shields, a considerable portion of Waukegan township and of West Deerfield have shown the poorest collections.

McHenry Levies Paid

Some of the country townships have paid over 90 per cent of their levies, it is said, but they represent a smaller portion of the total tax levy.

In McHenry county 92 per cent of the total tax levy has been collected, according to Harry F. Pett, county treasurer. However, about \$94,492 is delinquent in the county.

Report Progress in New Relief Project

The Deerfield Relief organization is enthusiastically engaged in their relief drive and report that many of the residents are taking advantage of the "trading stamps" to assist the locally unemployed. All of the merchants have received their stamps and the public is urged to ask for these stamps.

Cards for application for work may be procured at the Deerfield Pharmacy.

This is a new system of procuring funds to help the needy, and with the co-operation of every citizen of the village, no drive will be necessary, yet everyone will be helping to bring relief to the village. Remember to get your stamps from the merchant. If he doesn't offer them to you, ask for them.
