

Collections, however, have been better in the farming sections of the county and in the residential suburbs than in the industrial area.

Tax collection in Zion and Benton township have been very slow this year, according to Mr. Morse. The North Chicago section of Waukegan township and of West Deerfield have shown the poorest collections.

McHenry Levies Paid

Some of the country townships have paid over 90 per cent of their levies, it is said, but they represent a smaller portion of the total tax

In McHenry county 92 per cent of the total tax levy has been collected, according to Harry F. Pett, county treasurer. However, about \$94,492 is delinquent in the county.

New Relief Project
