LOUIS MILLER, 42, KILLED NEAR RACINE

Local Man, Employee of North Shore Line 16 Years, Falls Under Car

Louis Miller, 42 years old, of 32 Michigan avenue, Highwood, a conductor on the North Shore electric line, was killed about 2 o'clock Thursday morning of last week at Piper's siding, south of Racine, Wis.

Mr. Miller, an employe of the road for 16 years, apparently slipped on a piece of ice as he was running to catch a box car, for he plunged head-foremost under the fourth car and was decapitated.

The crew was switching freight cars on the electric road at Piper's siding, which is midway between Racine and Kenosha, and the accident occurred about 2 a.m. While there were no eye witnesses to the accident, it is believed by members of the train crew that he lost his footing on the slippery ice and fell across the track.

Members of the train crew included Harry Norris, of Waukegan, motorman, and three brakemen, as follows: M. L. Perry, of Waukegan, Harold Hangebrauch, of Gurnee, and Mr. Oscar Burson of Milwaukee. Episcopal church, of this city. He was a World war veteran.

Mr. Miller was a member of A. O. Fay lodge, A. F. & A. M., of Highland Park; of the Highland Park chapter of the Royal Arch Masons; and of the Grace Methodist Episcopal church, of this city.

Funeral services were held at the Masonic temple in this city last Saturday afternoon at 2:30, with the Rev. N. S. Nye, pastor of Grace M. E. church and Daniel Webster, Worshipful Master of Mizpah lodge, A. F. and A. M. of Chicago, officiating. Burial was in Memorial Park, Evanston.

Mr. Miller is survived by Mrs. Miller; two children, Melvin, 10 years old, and Jean, 4 years old; his father, Philip Miller, of Chicago; and two sisters and one brother, who live in Chicago and Wisconsin. A daughter, Doris, died nine years ago at the age of 3.

"At Madam Delgay's" Is Given Successful Performance Here Last Week

Oak Terrace School, Short of Funds, Is Closing For 5 Weeks

The Oak Terrace grammar school in Highwood, will close tomorrow, Dec. 16, for a five-week period, on account of lack of funds to keep in operation.

There will be only eight months of school at Oak Terrace this year. Some of the teachers have taken a 45 per cent cut in wages, in an effort to keep the school open as long as possible.

The action of closing is necessary because of school funds being tied up in two closed banks, the Highwood State Bank, and the North Shore Trust Company, the latter in Highland Park, also because of tax delinquencies.
