LOUIS MILLER, 42, KILLED NEAR RACINE

Local Man, Employe of North Shore Line 16 Years, Falls Under Car

Louis Miller, 42 years old, of 32 Michigan avenue, Highwood, a conductor on the North Shore electric line, was killed about 2 o'clock Thursday morning of last week at Piper's siding, south of Racine, Wis.

Mr. Miller, an employe of the road. for 16 years, apparently slipped on piece of ice as he was running to catch a box car, for he plunged head-foremost under the fourth car and was decapitated.
