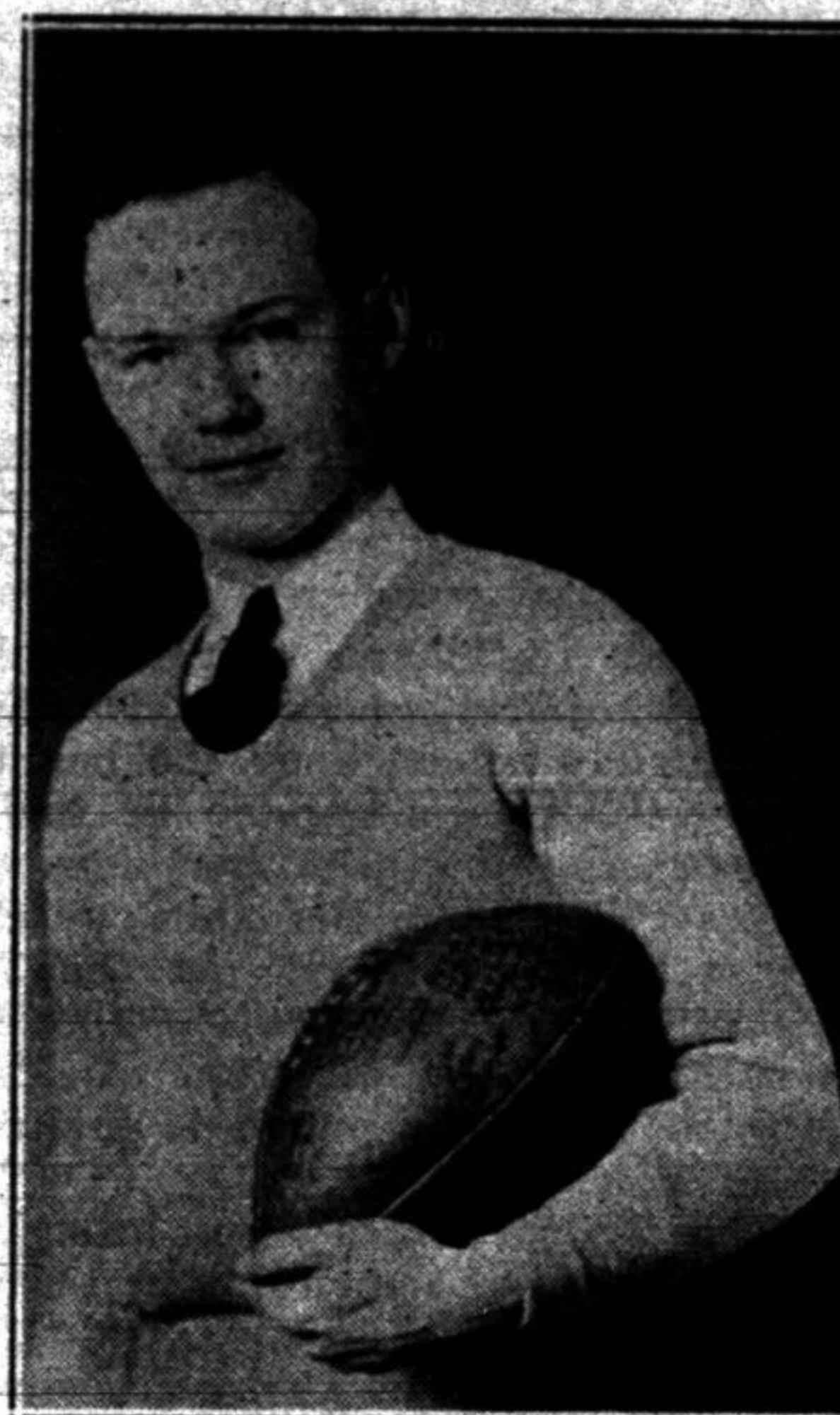
Ravinia School Holds Carol Sing Dec. 20

Twenty questions were presented, covering the scores of games played during the season just closed, the records of athletes, and the recognition of college songs played on the piano. The winner was Chester Skidmore, who was presented with a football used by Northwestern in a game this past fall and autographed by the N. U. football squad.

"Alfred T. Sihler, president of the Men's Fellowship club, presided. There was the singing of all songs men and boys love, in addition to the rendering of many selections by the quartet of Northwestern University.

"An impressive feature was the bringing to the front of four boys each six years of age and having them stand on chairs beside F. D. Everett, the oldest member of the club. Mr. Everett had just celebrated his 93rd birthday two days before.

"Dr. H. C. Nichols presided over the last part of the program, and introduced Tom Robinson, for years swimming coach at Northwestern. In the absence of football coach, "Tug" Wilson, kept at home by the flu, Mr. Robinson gave a very entertaining account of his experiences as an athlete coach. Then he explained a film reel showing swimming pictures featuring various strokes and showing Johnny Weismuller in action. This was followed by a showing of pictures of the last Northwestern-Purdue game.
