Community Service, Inc., Is
Sponsor of Activities at
Elks Building

Community Service Inc., the recreation organization in Highland Park, announces that it is opening and sponsoring a Community Center for people in this city. For the past several weeks the staff of Community Service, Inc., has been busy fitting up the new center so that basketball, volleyball, play room, dressing room and other recreation facilities will be available.

The new Community Center is located in the Elks club building at the southeast corner of Laurel and McGovern streets. Through the kindness of the Highland Park Elks club it has become possible for Community Service, Inc., to open this center. "We are sure that this kindness will be more than appreciated by all boys, girls, men and women who plan to make use of the Community Center," says the director, George Scheuchenpflug.

The Community Center will be open to the public daily from 2 to 5:30 p.m. and from 7 to 10 p.m. In addition it will be open during the holidays from 9 to 12 mornings for children of grade school age.

Friday, older boys lightweight basketball league.

The Community Center is available for activities other than those listed above.

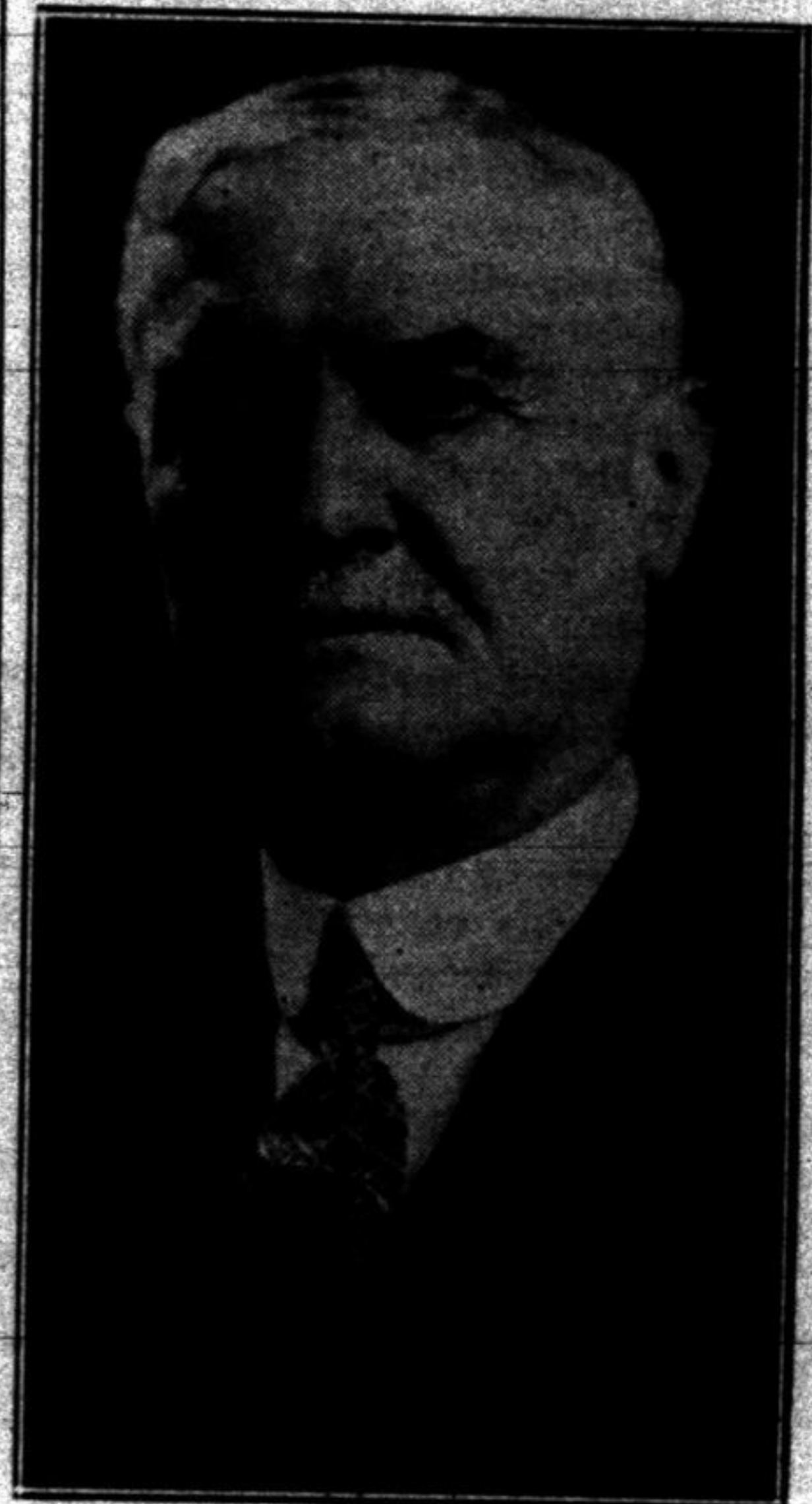

Funeral Services Friday for
Pioneer Iron, Steel
Manufacturer

George M. Bard, pioneer iron and steel manufacturer, died at his Highland Park residence Wednesday morning. He was born July 22, 1852. For many years he was active in the iron and steel industry, starting with the Bourne Fuller company, Cleveland, Ohio.

He was one of the organizers and president of the Indiana Iron com-

pany, of Muncie, Ind., and pioneered in the use of natural gas in the manufacture of iron and steel. He later participated in the organization of the Republic Iron and Steel com-
