CHRISTMAS SEASON AT CITY CHURCHES

Special Services Being Held for Highland Park Congregations

Highland Park's churches are observing the Christmas season with dozens of special services, some of which began early this week, and many of which will occupy much of next Sunday, Christmas day. The congregations and all classes of the Sunday schools of the local churches are participating in these Christmas programs, which are listed in detail in other articles in this week's issue of The Highland Park Press.

The Bethany Evangelical church is a place of many activities this week, in preparation for its Christmas celebration. The church program began with a young people's party on Monday evening, and will extend through the 4:30 vesper Sunday afternoon, when the combined choirs of the Bethany Evangelical church and the Bethlehem Evangelical church, of Deerfield, will present the Christmas cantata, "Tidings of Great Joy."

The Redeemer Evangelical Lutheran church will celebrate Christmas at three services, one on Christmas eve and two on Christmas day. The local men rescued four colts from an adjoining stable after it had caught fire from the large building, and a nearby farmer rescued two others from the main building, but in spite of their frenzied work, 20 other animals perished.

Tightly fastened and locked box stalls hampered the work of the rescuers, and the building in which the 20 ponies perished was destroyed, despite all efforts of the Legion officials and farmers to save it before firemen arrived.

The big estate is now operated by the Northern Trust company. The ponies were being cared for by those in charge of the estate for independent owners.
