Pay As You Enter, the three-act
comedy to be given by the Deerfield
Post of the American Legion and the
Deerfield Civic Players, will be
presented at the Deerfield Gram-
mar school, Thursday and Friday
nights of next week, Jan. 12 and 13.
Seats may be reserved without ex-
tra charge, it is announced, if res-
ervations are made on or before
Jan. 11, at the Deerfield Pharmacy.
Tickets may be purchased there or
from members of the Legion or cast
of the play.

The plot of *Pay As You Enter*
concerns the experiences of a prin-
cess of the small fictitious kingdom
of "Sylvania," who arrives in Amer-
ica incognito to earn a livelihood.
The differences in thought and use
of words of the two countries caus-
es many humorous and amusing sit-
uations. A romantic theme runs
through the comedy. A peculiar
twist of fate finds that the candy
made by the princess and her maid
for their new-made friends, leads
to the making of their fortunes.

The name of the play is derived
from the experiences of the prin-
cess and her maid who thought they
were coming to a free country and
found, on the contrary, that the
street cars, subways, elevated cars,
electric light and gas meters, tele-
phones, rent, and many other items
all bore the sign "pay as you enter"
or conditions of similar intent.

voices; the Highwood Trio, musici-
