North Shore Board Sends a Resolution to Opera President

Full support to the summer program of the Ravinia Opera company is promised by the North Shore Real Estate board, in a resolution passed by that organization recently. Opera at Ravinia was discontinued last summer for the first season in more than 20 years.

Realizing that the opera at Ravinia is a boon to the entire north shore, and desiring to boost any project which will make the area a more desirable place in which to live, the leaders in real estate activities have framed a resolution which has been sent to Louis Eckstein, president of the Opera company, which reads as follows:

"Whereas: There has for several years been a growing interest in the programs at Ravinia, and

"Whereas: During the past year the attendance has decreased to such a degree, that the management has been obliged to operate at a loss, and

"Whereas: This fact may be attributed in a large measure, not to lack of interest, but to general economic conditions, and

Anyone interested in reducing taxes through the substitution of a less unwieldy form of administration is invited to attend this open meeting. Mr. Thomas' talk will in all probability get under way some time between 8:30 and 9 o'clock.

Cost of Medical Care Is Discussion At Next Ravinia Forum Meeting

The fourth consecutive meeting of the Ravinia Community Forum will be held on Sunday evening, Jan. 22, when the subject of "The Cost of Medical Care" will be the topic of discussion. Owing to the vital importance of health, and of maintaining adequate health services to individuals and the community, particularly in time of grave economic embarrassments, the topic has more than passing importance.

Dr. C. R. Rorem, a research specialist attached to the National committee on the Cost of Medical Care, will address the meeting, describing the origin and development of the investigation and its majority and minority findings, which have recently received national publicity. The committee was formed in 1927 and included 48 persons under the active chairmanship of Dr. Ray Lyman Wilbur, Secretary of the Interior. Over half its members were physicians and dentists, the remainder including hospital administrators, public health officials, economists, educators, social workers and representatives of the general public. It issued 26 detailed reports and, at the end of the five year period, late in 1932, two final publications with concrete recommendations for community action. Its work was not officially connected with the government; its support came principally from grants-in-aid of research from eight of the large philanthropic foundations.

Dr. Rorem's own work was supported by the Julius Rosenwald fund of Chicago. The Ravinia Forum committee, recognizing the importance of the subject, particularly invites the physicians and health officials of Highland Park and Ravinia to attend this meeting, in the upper hall of the Ravinia Village house. At the last meeting, by a large majority vote of those present, it was decided to make a twenty-five cent admission charge to future meetings of the Forum.
