34 has three main divisions: (1) Constructive Economy in Government; (2) Prevention and Relief of Unemployment, and (3) International Co-operation.

"Construction Economy in Government," the first plank in the platform, will be discussed by Mrs. Allan Wolff, Mrs. Clarence Balke, Mrs. A. O. Mason, Jr., and Mrs. G. K. Hardacre. In this same connection, Dr. Marcia Lauer and Mrs. N. H. Meiners will discuss "Maintenance of Standards" and the need for opposing such destructive "economy" as would threaten to destroy essential services.

Discussion of "Prevention and Relief of Unemployment" will be under two headings. Mrs. H. A. Sellers will consider "Provision for Public Relief Funds to Be Administered by Trained Personnel." Mrs. R. S. Simons will cover the subject of the "Establishment of a Co-ordinated System of Federal and State Employment Exchanges as One Factor in the Prevention as Well as Relief of Unemployment."

Mrs. Warren Danley will present the matter of "International Co-operation" in its various aspects.

After lunch, Mrs. W. W. Ramsay, state chairman for "Efficiency in Government," will speak on "Economy in Government."

On Jan. 21, Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt, wife of the president-elect, vice-president of the New York League of Women Voters, will speak at a League program at Orchestra hall, Chicago. Mrs. Roosevelt's subject will be "Politics and Young People." Tickets may be obtained from Mrs. Marc A. Law.
