HIGHLAND PARK ILLINOIS

The Highland Park Library has for circulation and reference 20,873 adult books; 5,131 children's books; 90 current magazines and newspapers; many pictures and pamphlets; books in foreign languages.

The Highland Park Library serves without charge 6,781 borrowers; many who use the library for reference and study; every Highland Park resident who wishes to use it.

During 1932 the library circulated 130,592 books, magazines and pamphlets. Previous years: 1928, 70,682; 1929, 80,275; 1930, 93,642; 1931, 115,329; 1932, 130,592.

**Radio News**

On the bulletin board near the main entrance of the library are posted two radio announcements of special interest. On one you will find mention of a series of 24 broadcasts on the "Economic World Today." These are being sponsored by the National Advisory Council are Radio Education and are prepared by the staff of Brookings Institute in Washington, D. C. These current issues will be informally presented in the form of lively discussions and round-tables.

Another announcement sponsored by the National Broadcasting company is the "Educational Bulletin" which is monthly. The program for the month is divided into regular features, listed by the days of the week, and special events. Interesting comments are made on the latter which include programs on art, literature, and current events as well as music.

**Missions**

Re-Thinking Missions is a laymen's inquiry after one hundred years. This book contains the report of the commission appointed by the Laymen's Foreign Missions Inquiry to study missions in the Far East and to make recommendations concerning their future. Among the searching questions answered are those on denominational distinctions, the continuance of Foreign Missions, possible changes in program and personnel, and the attitude of Protestant Christianity

toward non-Christian religions. Pearl S. Buck, author of "The Good Earth" considers it a great book, for "it seems literally true in its every observation and right in its every conclusion."

**Recent Social Trends**

Just now the general public is greatly interested in the report of President Hoover's Research committee. After three years' study of the social life of the United States, a group of sociologists has made its report to supply bases of policies in the future development of the nation. This study, unique in the history of our country, is set forth in two volumes, a total of 1,600 pages.
