Religious Institute in Waukegan Jan. 28

An all-day county institute of religious education for teachers and workers with children in the Sunday schools and vacation schools of religion in Lake county will be held at the First Methodist church of Waukegan, on Saturday, Jan. 28.

This institute is under the direction of the Lake County Council of Religious Education, and the institute program has been planned by Mrs. Russell H. Edwards, Children's division superintendent, and her committee. The meeting will be conducted as a school, and the most recent teaching methods and latest ways of administering and promoting religious education of children will be presented by those who lead the group discussions.

Mrs. Thomas A. Goodwin, of Waukegan, a worker of training and experience with small children, will have charge of the group who will study methods of training and teaching beginners, or kindergarten children; Mrs. S. T. Dexter, of Highland Park, who has had years of experience and training in the work with primary children, will lead the discussion on methods for primary teachers and workers; and Miss Irene Rockenbach, of Deerfield, secretary of the Council of Religious Education, and Children's division specialist, will have charge of the section for Junior department teachers and officers. The topic to be discussed in the morning session is "Stories, and How to Tell Them," and the afternoon subject is "Teaching Through Activities." Mrs. B. D. Frederick, of Waukegan, will lead a demonstration primary worship service, and Miss Nell Schlung, of Waukegan, will have charge of a junior worship service. Leaders in Sunday schools of the county have been asked to bring some of the work done by the elementary grades of their schools, for exhibit at the institute.

The purpose of the institute is to train teachers of religion so that they may do more efficient work in the Sunday school, and vacation school of religion, and to aid parents, as well as all Sunday school officers, to understand the religious needs and development of children. The session will open at 10:15 a.m. and continue until 4 o'clock in the afternoon.



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
