The distinction of holding the first of a series of twenty qualifying rounds of duplicate contract bridge with the prize of a free 19-day trip to Central America and the West Indies, has been awarded the Moraine hotel.

Highland Park, with many good bridge players and the newly formed North Shore Bridge club, under the direction of Clarice Wellman and Needham Ball, secured the opportunity to play two of these qualifying rounds, the first of which was held Tuesday, Jan. 31, and the second to be held at the Moraine hotel, Tuesday evening, Feb. 7, at 8:15 p.m.

Top score qualifying winners who are now entered in the semi-finals are J. L. Haas and R. N. Ball, 49½; Mmes. Stern and Pick, 46; Mr. and Mrs. Milledge Bullard, 45½; Walter and Alice Gracie, 44½; Messrs. Bardach and Kolinsky, 44½; Mr. and Mrs. Uhlman, 44; Mr. and Mrs. F. L. Rogers, 43½; Messrs. Silver cups were awarded to the high scoring players in the tournament of Tuesday night and similar cups will be awarded to next week's winners. Players in the first tournament who failed to qualify are eligible for qualification in the second tournament which will be open to all bridge players from Evanston to Milwaukee. That these tournaments are proving of great interest was attested by a large attendance in the face of inclement weather. A special attraction is the low-cost entrance fee. Players are urged to avail themselves of the feature of dinner at the hotel before the game as dinner and tournament play combined are only slightly more than the regular card fee.

**Speaker to Discuss Century of Progress**  
Richard V. Murison, of Kenilworth, an architect of international note and a volunteer speaker for the Century of Progress Exposition, will give an illustrated lecture stressing the architectural phases of the 1933 World's Fair at the Highland Park Woman's club on N. Sheridan road on Friday evening, Feb. 10, at 8:15.

The public is invited to attend this lecture, which is sponsored by the Art department of the Woman's club.

Mr. Murison completed his architectural training at Carnegie institute, later studying and traveling in Europe with letters from the United States Department of Commerce making a survey of the airports of Europe, visiting England, France, Germany and Belgium.

Since that time Mr. Murison is probably best known for his work in design and construction of airports and aviation buildings. During the past year he has been a much-sought-after speaker throughout the central states for the Century of Progress.

He is also known as the author of several articles on the architectural features of the 1933 exposition and has made many radio appearances discussing the topic. Mrs. Ross J. Beatty secured him as a speaker in Highland Park.

In connection with the evening's program, Mrs. James Freudenthal has arranged an interesting exhibit of architectural drawings, many of them originals and photographs of the Century of Progress structures.
