Highwood Election Preliminaries Are Getting Under Way

The long-predicted opposition to Mayor Evan Dever in the Highwood city election this spring materialized a few days ago when a new slate for mayor, treasurer and clerk was announced, says the Chicago Herald and Examiner.

Mr. Dever is finishing his first term, and has been the object of continued attacks since he took office, chiefly centering around the town's financial status, says the Chicago newspaper.

Cash Transfer Issue

An issue is expected to be made of the alleged transfer of \$1,500.00 from the city garbage fund last year, when the Highwood bank closed to pay city salaries, the corporation counsel ruling the mayor and council were liable for the funds' return to its proper source before they go out of office in April. It was learned that this sum was returned a month ago, according to word at the Highwood city hall.

Henry Liske announced the slate this spring, for which petitions already are in circulation, centers around Fred Weise, retiring city treasurer, for the office of mayor.

Mr. Liske, a former treasurer, collector, and alderman in Highwood, will himself seek the treasurer's job again, he said.

File Petitions March 1

For city clerk, against the incumbent, Albert Axt, the new Highwood Party will have as its candidate R. L. Umberhaun, also well known in the community.

The liveliest political battle in years is predicted by the "outs," who are to revive council battles of the last two years in an effort to unseat Mayor Dever and his followers.

Filing of petitions is set for March 1, and the last date is March 14.

Town Planning Will Be Discussed At Ravinia Forum Meeting Feb. 12

The fifth meeting of the Ravinia Forum will be held Sunday evening, Feb. 12, in the Ravinia Village House, when the subject of the evening will be "Town Planning and Co-Operative Reconstruction in Europe and America."

There will be two speakers, Jacob Crane, a resident of Highland Park, planning consultant for the state of Illinois, who visited Soviet Russia as an adviser to the official town-planning commission of the Russian government, engaged in the construction of new proletarian cities designed to meet the requirements of the machine age, will speak on that subject and present a motion picture film taken by himself in Russia.

Mr. Crane will be followed by Alfred Granger, of Chicago, past president of the Illinois Society of Architects, and founder of the Architects Club of Chicago, who will present an illustrated lecture on the co-operative reconstruction of Vienna. Mr. Granger lived about a year in the Austrian capital, and was an interested student of the great housing and city-planning activities there which, energetically supported by the Social-Democratic Party and the government of Vienna, and aided by the grant of credits by the municipality, resulted in the construction of thousands of model, low-cost apartments for the benefit of the impoverished classes of the city. The outstanding success of these great projects, from both the aesthetic and economic viewpoints, has attracted the attention of architects and social engineers everywhere, and demonstrated what even a stricken metropolis in a bankrupt country can do for itself by dint of imagination, courage, and co-operation.

Mr. Granger will discuss the economic as well as the original architectural methods employed to gain these results, which are of so much importance in a time of universal economic depression and paralysis of the building industries that many students and economists are pointing to them as the way out of our present predicament in America. "If this be socialism," say the satisfied Viennese, "make the most of it!"

John H. Millar, editor of Millar's Housing Letter, a resident of Highland Park, and a member of the Ravinia Forum committee, will preside. Residents of the two communities and their friends are invited to attend the forthcoming meeting Sunday evening, Feb. 12, at 8:15 o'clock.

STATE TAX LEVY HIGHER THIS YEAR

Fifty Cents of \$100 Valuation In Lake County Goes Into Illinois Treasury

On each \$100 valuation in Lake county this year (1932 levy) represents the state tax, as compared to 39 cents on each \$100 levied last year. More than 17 per cent of the 1932 tax levy (collectible in 1933) is for fixed charges, that is, bonds and interest. In other words, property owners in this county pay the state 50 cents, nearly 9 cents goes for the payment of state bonds and the interest thereon.

In Lake county (year before last) \$22,222.32 in taxes for state purposes were forfeited (the 1930 levy) and of the 1931 levy, the total state taxes forfeited (last year) was more than twice as much, or \$50,968.22.

The comparative statement of the state tax levy in Lake county for the past two years is as follows:
