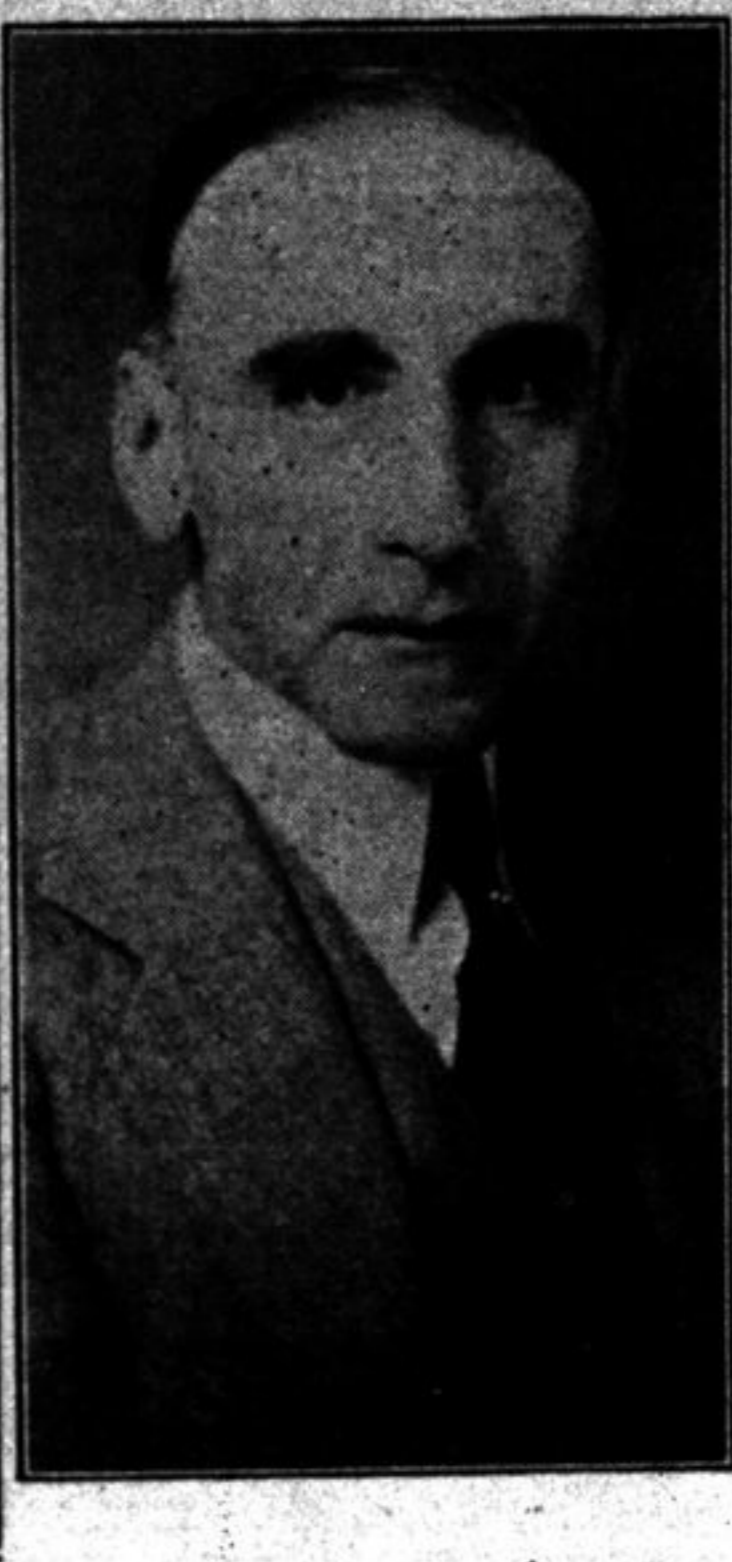
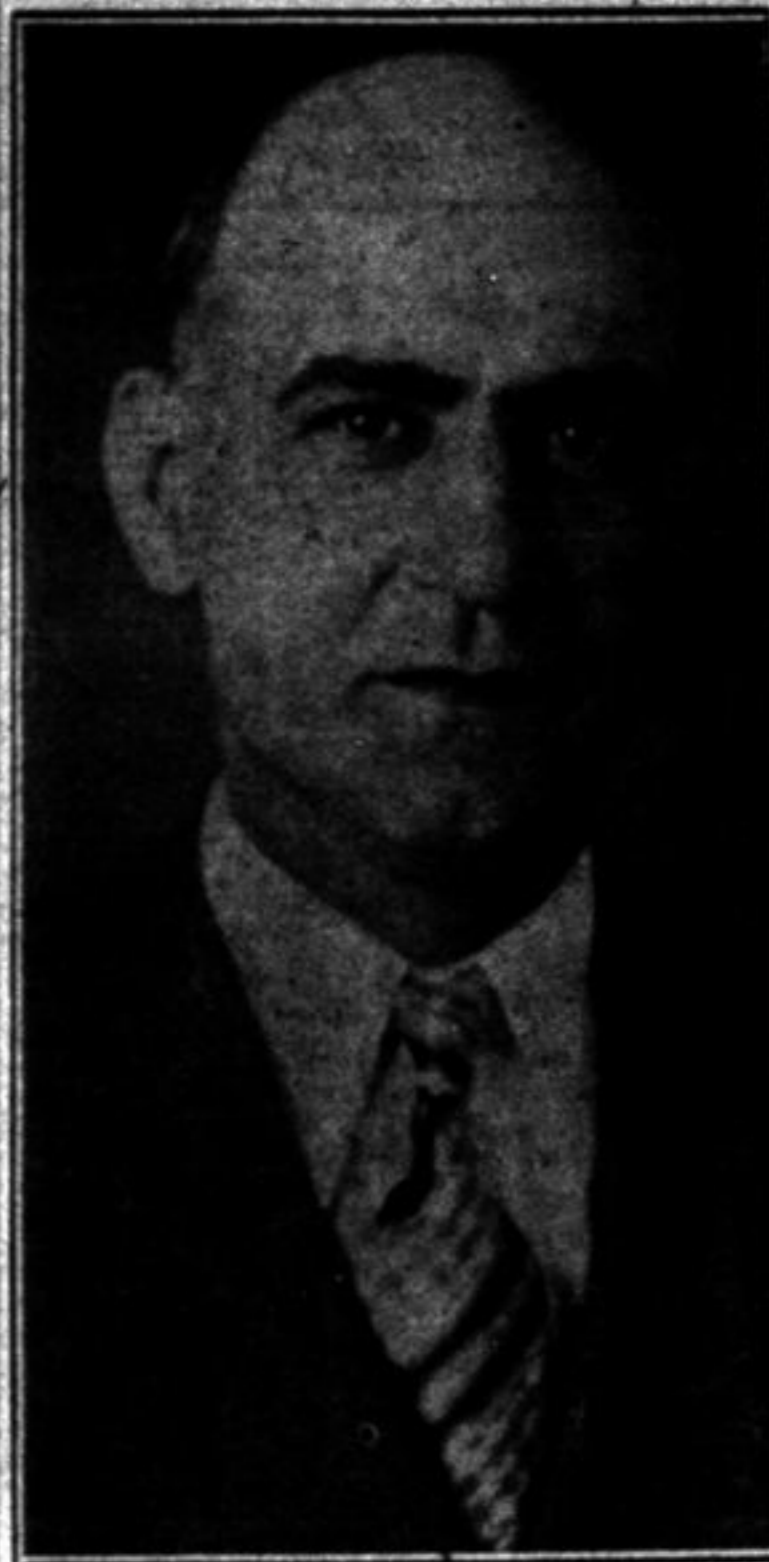


SUCCESSFUL HIGHWOOD SCOUT LEADERS

Police Radio System for Lake County Planned by Waukegan Chief

Plans broached by Chief of Police Edwin Ahlstrom of Waukegan to effect a police radio hook-up with the new fifty-watt broadcasting station being installed in Highland Park hit temporary snags, according to yesterday's Chicago Herald and Examiner.

It was Mr. Ahlstrom's idea to have all Lake County police departments, including the sheriff's office, equip their cars with short wave radios and telephonic connection with the Highland Park broadcaster, to make up for impending cuts in personnel among the various departments, particularly in Waukegan and in some of the smaller communities.

Fewer Men Needed
Mr. Ahlstrom indicated the forthcoming economy would be more than offset by the use of radios by which messages are received more promptly and fewer men are needed for continuous patrol work.

As soon as the chief's plan became known, however, difficulties arose, of a dual nature. First, the smaller towns in financial stress, such as Grays Lake, Libertyville, Deerfield, Highwood, North Chicago, Gurnee, Lake Villa, and similar places, find themselves not only hard-pressed to pay present salaries, but at a loss to learn where the radio equipment would be coming from, assuming first-class sets would have to be purchased, at least one in the smaller towns and up to three or four in the larger communities.

Phone Service Costly
Direct telephone wire service also is expensive, they claim, being necessary 24 hours a day to the broadcasting station if the system is to be effective at all times.

In Lake Forest Chief Frank Tiffany asserted he could not act in the matter of a hook up with the Highland Park police radio without council sanction, as the year-old radio arrangement with the Chicago police station has proven entirely satisfactory, and the Chicagoans have made several concessions and co-operated with Lake Forest to such an extent that the council as a whole is against a change at this time.

Lake Forest was the first Lake county town to adopt police radios, and Mr. Tiffany's annual report told the aldermen that faultless service has been obtained.

Until the financial and other matters can be ironed out, the proposed county-wide hookup with Waukegan as a nucleus must remain in the embryonic stage for some months, it is believed.
