as 55 below zero Tuesday, and clogged highways and rail lines under twenty-foot drifts in places.

**Motor Traffic Stopped**  
The 25-mile stretch of Sheridan Road between Evanston and Waukegan was partially blocked by drifts Tuesday, especially in one stretch that remained impassable practically all day. That was between the north limits of Highland and the south limits of Lake Forest, along the new stretch of pavement on the west side of Fort Sheridan. As in past years, the highway was piled high with drifts, and after 10 o'clock Tuesday morning, and until Wednesday noon, practically all motor traffic was stopped there.

Extra men were hired by Lake Forest, Highland Park and Highland to open the streets in those towns, and auto traffic in those three towns was permitted to operate practically all the time from the hour the blizzard struck until it stopped Tuesday night.

men working the sewing room, helps in the keeping of the time books, and gives her cheerful attention to countless demands made upon her. Officially she is only one of the voluntary workers, but literally her services are invaluable.

Thanks to the generosity of the community and to the contributions from the Red Cross, the storeroom of Social Service is as well stocked as many city ready-to-wear shops. Two Highland Park women are in charge of this storeroom. Assisted by other volunteer workers, they keep a list of all merchandise received, as well as every garment given out. They are most versatile in their salesmanship, including suits, coats, shirts, dresses, shoes for men, women and children. At present they are confronted with the problem of fitting out a needy woman who requires garments size 52. Undaunted, these two women will solve this problem, as they have others, so that no needy resident of this village need go cold or tattered.

Another Highland Park woman has volunteered for a job supposed to be the secret desire of all women. She is the official "bargain hunter." And what a success! She hunts up job lots of whatever the Social Service storeroom stands in need of — be it shoes or lamps or trousseurs. Her efficiency at driving an advantageous bargain puts her in a class with the most efficient purchasing agents of large merchandising organizations.

Another young woman reports for service two days a week, doubling in duties as chauffeur or office assistant. She may drive a patient to the hospital, deliver baskets of groceries, or help with checking lists in the office. Whatever the need of the moment may be, that she does like a soldier, without any questioning or demurrer.

The sewing room is the responsibility of another suburbanite. She sees that the workroom is supplied with the buttons, the thread, the needles, all the findings required by the women at work. If the sewing machines require repairs, she sees that they are taken care of. As a result, a number of women are enabled to assist in helping their families over this economic crisis.

Several women contribute their services as investigators. They visit homes and make reports on cases which require special attention not coming under the head of the routine types of aid given by Social Service.

Fortunate indeed the individuals or the organization that can enlist the services of women so devoted.
