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Deerfield Reduces  
Water Leakage 10%

By constant testing of all water mains and by the closing, plugging of all unused subdivision mains, Deerfield has reduced its leakage to about ten per cent. The average leakage for a town, according to a Deerfield trustee, is about twenty-five per cent—so the village is to be commended upon its ability to bring it below average. It is reported that Highland Park's leakage exceeds Deerfield, having about fifteen per cent.

Before a check of water mains was made, more water leaked out in one subdivision alone, than all the water consumed by the village. Now that all leaks have been checked and the water situation with Highland Park is agreeably settled, the consumers of water in Deerfield should make every effort to pay their bills promptly. By so doing, they will help their village to meet its obligations when due. Water bills are not a tax. Water is a commodity which householders use (the same as gas, electricity or telephone,) and agree to pay for when bill is rendered.

The village will pay off its indebtedness of \$18,000 to Highland Park at the rate of at least \$2,000 annually and \$3,600 if possible.
