Mr. Hanna visited our school during the week of final exams. His inspection of the school included complete investigation of the buildings, administration, teachers' duties, and courses.

He reports that the school plant, sanitation system, and instrumental equipment is adequate throughout. The library, he observed, has marked advantages in the seating arrangement and is fitted to suit the courses and pupils.

The administration and supervision both are good, he emphasized, and the principal, Mr. Richard L. Sandwick, is of well known successful high school administrator. As to

Morton High Barred by Suburban League

The huge J. Sterling Morton High School of Cicero has been dropped from further athletic competition by the members of the Chicago Suburban League.

Morton high has an enrollment of some 8000 students and a reputation of producing unbeatable teams. They have been an ancient rival of Deerfield-Shields whom they meet next Friday (tomorrow) in a suburban league basketball game.

Strong in Athletics Morton high athletic teams have a fine standing in past performances, having won the Stagg national interscholastic tournament at the University of Chicago in 1927, the Stagg Christmas tournament last year and then went on to the state championship.

In 1928 Morton was admitted to the Suburban League composed of Oak Park, Deerfield-Shields, New Trier, Evanston, Proviso, and Morton. All of these schools are members of the Illinois State High School Athletic Association.

That Peter White is enjoying his work at Massachusetts Institution of Technology and is receiving high grades is indicated in a recent letter to Mr. Sandwick.

"Having been wanting to write you for a long time, but deferred from doing so until I had something of interest concerning my progress at M.I.T.," writes Peter. "The grades for the first semester have been out since the third of February but I have delayed sending mine in hope that I might learn my position in the class; but so far, no list has been published. I can tell you, however, that I am higher than a good friend of mine who is here on one of the Regional Scholarships."

"While I do not have my report cards with me to check, I believe my record as a freshman at Deerfield for the first semester coincides with my record as a freshman at M.I.T. as follows:
