



The land in the hands of large holders such as corporation agriculturists and defunct subdivision promoters is only a portion of the available lands. Large farms defaulting on taxes can be subdivided into small tracts and tenanted without injuring or removing the present owner who is defaulting his tax.

Around the large cities, for instance Chicago, there are large tracts of forest preserves and thousands of acres of privately owned farm lands. Portions of these privately owned farm lands could be made available if these portions were exempted from exhorbitant
