Deerfield C. of C. To Meet This Evening

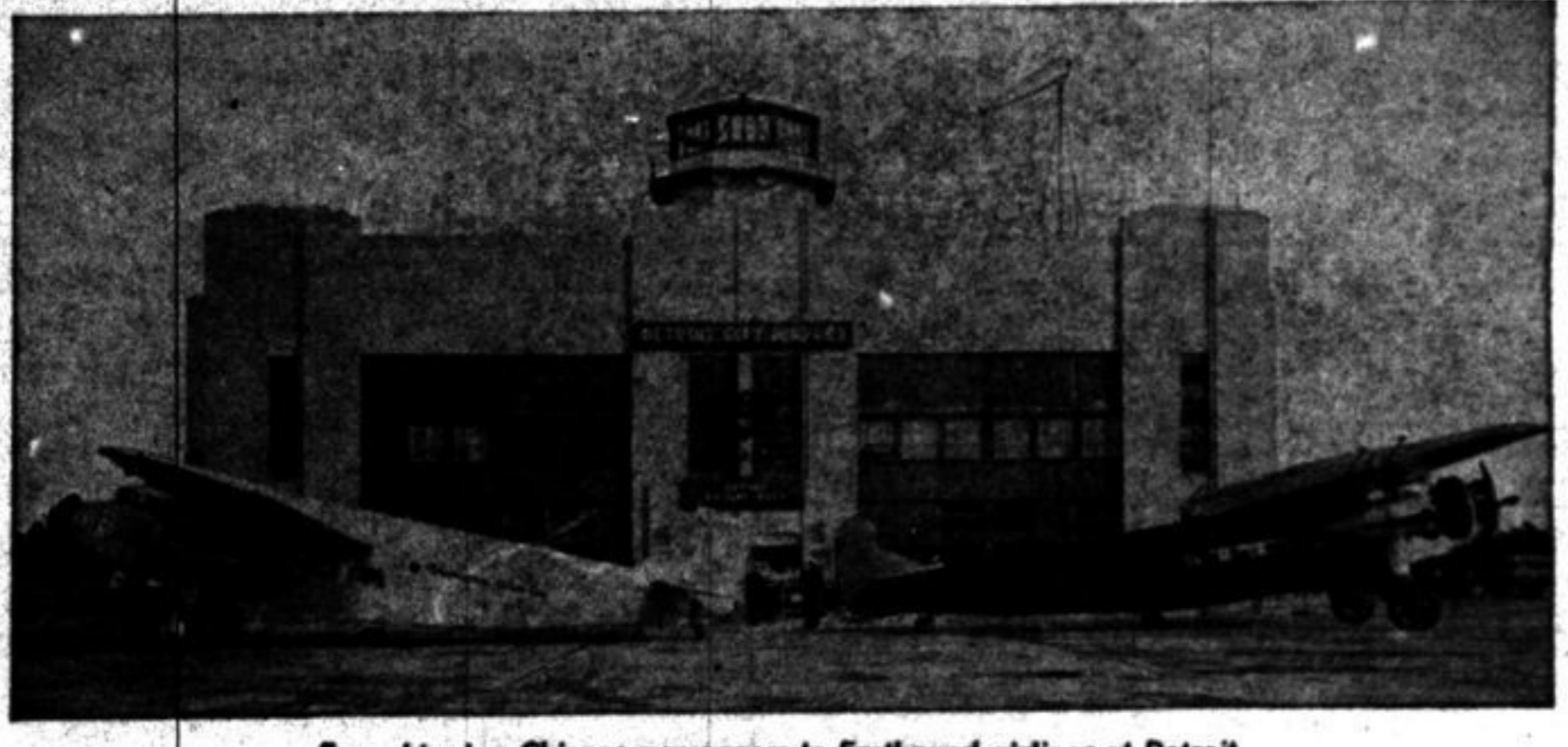
