**British American
Players To Present

A Research Committee**

The recent appointment of Headmaster John Wayne Richards, of Lake Forest Academy, to membership on the National Committee on Research, in Secondary Education brings another signal honor to the educational thought and practice.

well-known local educator. This committee functions under the auspices of the United States Commissioner of Education.

Membership in this committee is another mark of recognition for Mr. Richards' outstanding contribution to American secondary education in the form of his "New Plan in Education," which was officially inaugurated as a part of the curriculum at Lake Forest Academy in 1930. Many elements of the plan, now generally known in educational circles as the "Richards' Plan," have since been adopted by leading preparatory schools throughout the country.

On Sunday, Feb. 26, Mr. Richards will depart for Minneapolis where he will attend a two-day meeting of about fifteen school heads who comprise the membership of the national committee. These educators, who are leaders in their fields from all parts of the country, will investigate and discuss curricular changes in secondary schools and new trends in

**educational thought and practice. Pa-
dicular emphasis will be placed
upon the study of possible changes
in practice which would bring about
a more unified connection between
the secondary schools and the fresh-
man year in college.**

While in Minneapolis, Mr. Richards anticipates meeting many of his former Academy students who are now residents of that city and St. Paul.

**Lake Forest College
To Announce Changes
In Curriculum Soon**

In its 1932-33 catalogue which will appear March 1, Lake Forest College will announce several important curricular changes. The changes involve the grouping of the departments of instruction into closely correlated divisions, the establishment of field or concentration in place of the major system, the reduction in the number of hours of required courses, and the introduction of an orientation course, "The Rise of Contemporary Civilization."

The changes were begun more than a year ago by President Herbert McComb Moore and have been worked out by faculty members and administrative officers during the intervening time.

Courses in mathematics are no longer required for a degree, the number of required hours in religion has been cut from six to three, the language requirement has been changed from twelve hours to six or twelve hours depending upon the student's preparation in that field, and the new orientation course is substituted as a requirement for the twelve hours formerly required in Social Science.

The Orientation course will be developed by the heads of the social science departments and lectures will be given by other members of the faculty. In addition, men prominent in business, governmental, and sociological affairs in Chicago will lecture on practical world affairs.

In making these changes the Lake Forest faculty has referred to the experience of other progressive institutions who have adopted such changes in line with modern educational theories.

AN ORDINANCE
CALLING A GENERAL BIEN-
NIAL ELECTION FOR THE
YEAR 1933 FOR TWO COM-
MISSIONERS OF THE HIGHLAND
PARK EAST PARK DISTRICT,
COUNTY OF LAKE AND STATE
OF ILLINOIS.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF
COMMISSIONERS OF THE HIGHLAND
PARK EAST PARK DISTRICT, LAKE
COUNTY, ILLINOIS:

SECTION 1.—That the general biennial election of the Highland Park East Park District be and the same is hereby ordered to be held in the Highland Park East Park District, in the County of Lake and State of Illinois, on the first Tuesday in April, A.D. 1933, to-wit: April 4, 1933, between the hours of 7:00 o'clock in the morning and 5:00 o'clock in the afternoon of said day for the purpose of electing the following officers of the said Highland Park East Park District, to-wit:

One Commissioner for the full term of six years.
One Commissioner for the short term of four years to fill vacancy.

SECTION 2.—That each of the election precincts of said Highland Park East Park District as described and created in and by an ordinance entitled, "An Ordinance creating and defining election precincts in the Highland Park East Park District," passed on the 24th day of February, 1931, and approved on the 24th day of February, 1931, be and they are hereby, respectively, declared and created election districts or precincts for said election, that the voting places in and for each of the respective precincts shall be as follows:

First Precinct—Old City Hall Building, 549 Central Avenue.
Second Precinct—380 Central Avenue.
Third Precinct—361 Roger Williams Avenue.

Fourth Precinct—Residence of George A. Nixon, at the northeast corner of Eastwood and Southland Avenues.

SECTION 3.—That the following named voters of said Highland Park East Park District be and they are hereby respectively appointed and created Judges and Clerks of and for said election:

SECTION 4.—That the Secretary of the Highland Park East Park District be, and she is hereby, directed to provide for the giving of notice of said election and conducting the same as provided by law and notify the Clerks and Judges of election.

SECTION 5.—That at said election the polls shall be opened at 7:00 o'clock in the morning and shall be closed at 5:00 o'clock in the evening of the first Tuesday of April, A.D. 1933.

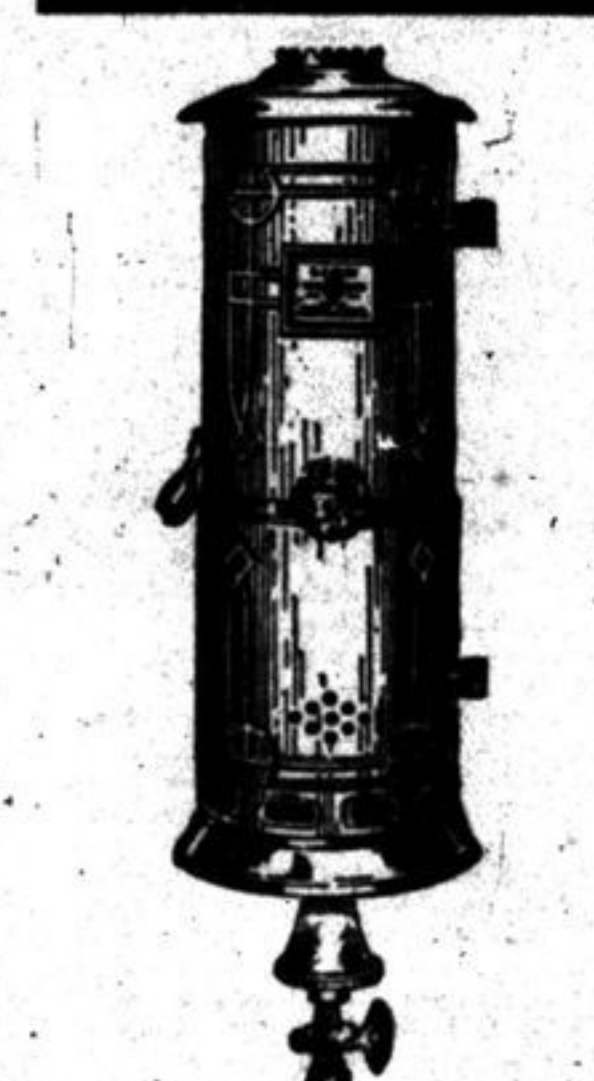
