J. F. L. Curtis, Former Local Resident, Dies in Pasadena, Calif.

John F. L. Curtis, member of the brokerage firm of Clement, Curtis and Company of Chicago, a former resident of Highland Park, died last Saturday of a heart attack in his room at the Huntington Hotel in Pasadena, Calif. He was 67 years old, and had been vacationing in California for two weeks. He became ill a little more than a week ago when he collapsed after a game of golf.

Mr. Curtis was born in Chicago and began his business career with Franklin McVeagh and Company, wholesale grocers. In 1901 he became a partner in the brokerage firm. He was a member of the New York and Chicago stock exchanges, the Chicago Board of Trade, and the New Orleans Cotton Exchange. He was also a member of the Union League, Chicago, Knollwood, Onwentsia and Shore Acres clubs.

Mr. Curtis lived at 1200 Lake Shore Drive, Chicago. He is survived by Mrs. Curtis, a son, John Guernsey Curtis, and a daughter Mrs. Dorothy Frances Rowley, of Lake Forest. Funeral services were held in Chicago this week.
