and will continue to oppose the attempt of any imperialistic clique to import into the Pacific Basin, which America regards today as her front door on the world, the methods of military conquest, treaty flouting, and diplomatic chicanery, which have made a hell out of Europe. If the Japanese people are willing to condone or are unable to prevent the use of these methods they must expect unalterable opposition from America."

"If the Japanese military and naval clique persists it must bring the eventual ruin of Japan—either before or after a clash with the United States. Economic collapse, followed by revolution and Bolshevism are the logical developments in Japan which the American people must be prepared to face.

Mr. Close will address the Highland Park Woman's Club on the subject "Behind the News from Asia." The lecture will take place at 2:30 p.m. on Tuesday, March 7, at the club house.

Dalcroze Eurhythmics Demonstration Mar. 10 at Ridge School

A Dalcroze eurhythmics demonstration will be held at Ridge School Friday evening, March 10, under the direction of Mrs. Irma Nixon.

The method of eurhythmics originated and developed by Jacques Dalcroze is an education system which offers training in, and by rhythm. An English educator has defined eurhythmics as "training in the use of the body as a musical instrument. More simply said, eurhythmics is a rhythmic, bodily response to music.

The following program will be given:

1. Demonstration of directing.
2. Presentation of note values through the use of the feet.
3. Combining rhythms with feet and directing with arms.
4. Methods of learning rests and synchronization.
5. Conducting (a) pathetic accent, (b) accelerando, (c) ritardando, (d) canon.
6. Different compositions will be directed and rhythmically worked out through the use of feet and directing. One of these compositions is an original song written in three parts by the children of Ridge School.
7. Several rhythmic stunts and games which develop concentration will conclude this part of the program.

On the same evening the 7-H Club of the school, which is made up of children in the seventh and eighth grades, will sponsor a spring bazaar. They have been very busy during their art and manual training classes getting ready for this event and hope that everyone interested in the school and their work will find it possible to come.

Doors open at 6:30 p.m. the Dalcroze or musical program starting at 8.
