Local Bible Classes, Send Delegates to Grayslake Meeting

The Adult Education Conference held at the Grayslake M. E. Church last Friday evening, under the direction of the Lake County Council of Religious Education, was very well attended by representatives of adult Bible classes in Highland Park, Half Day, Millburn, Gurnee, North Chicago, Libertyville, Lake Villa, Grayslake and other parts of the county.

Mrs. F. E. DeYoe, of North Chicago, told of the activities of the woman's class of the North Chicago Presbyterian Church School, and George A. Bray, teacher of the men's adult class of the Bethany Evangelical Church of Highland Park, gave an outline of the work that is being done by that class.

The principal addresses of the evening were delivered by Rev. William Rule, of North Chicago, who sketched the aims and objectives of adult religious education, and Rev. Clare J. Hewitt, of Lake Villa, who spoke of the adult class in the rural and small town church. The addresses were followed by a helpful

discussion of the subject. After the program the delegates were invited to the dining room of the church where the women's class acted as hostesses and served a light luncheon.

Officers of the County Council of Religious Education express themselves as highly pleased by the attendance and interest shown in this the first effort of the adult division in Lake County. Mrs. H. S. McKeown of Grays Lake, is superintendent of the division responsible for the conference.

Plans are being made to hold two district institutes in the northern part of the county, during April, under the direction of the district and county councils of religious education.

Mary Ann Frocks will sell a line of exclusively styled but inexpensive dresses, suits and coats.

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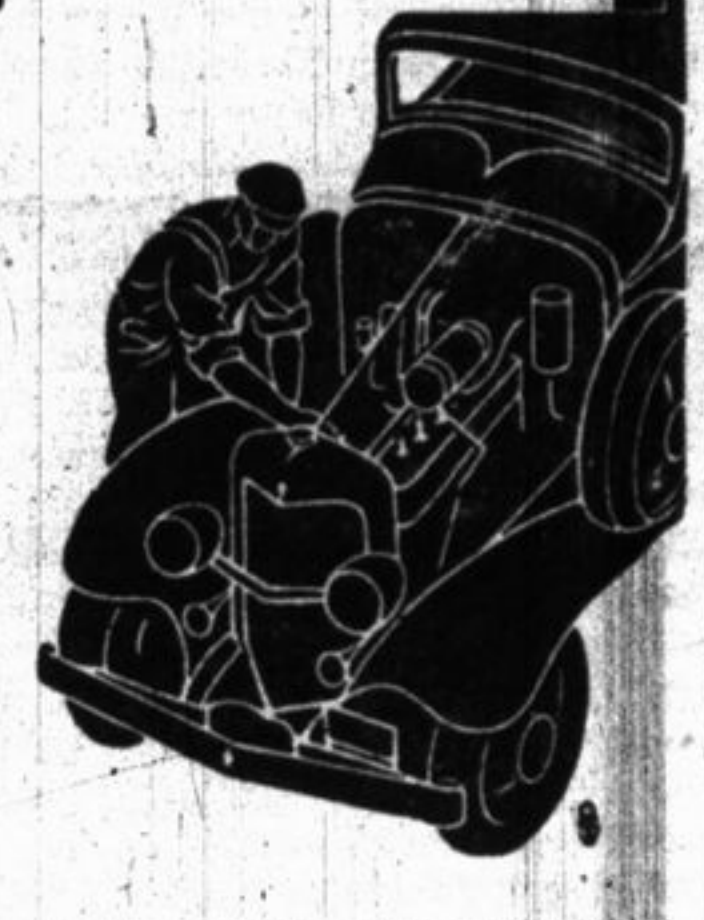
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
