The evening gathering to which the fathers were guests of honor included an exhibit of school work and an evening of fun playing games in the gymnasium.

The committee greatly appreciated the assistance of the Deerfield Press in its publicity of the P.T.A. which helped to increase attendance at its meetings.

The 1932-33 season of the Deerfield Parent-Teacher Association upheld the traditions of P.T.A. organizations, in not being a clearing house for grievances, but brought to the teachers and the parents ideas and much food for thought.
