In Shields hall, opposite the main office of Deerfield-Shields, stands a large trophy case, filled with many massive loving cups, won in various track and field meets throughout the county.

Recently Deerfield-Shields entered the Lake County meet and carried off first honors with little trouble. Several mornings after this meet, Shields hall trophy case fairly glistened with bright colored medals and here's the reason.

Saturday we took fourth at the prep relays held at Dyche Stadium, Northwestern University, with 22 points. Eight men were entered and these eight men brought home six more medals to add to the collection in the trophy case.

All this goes to show that Deerfield-Shields is by far, ahead of many many schools as far as track is concerned, and why not? They have Coach "Deac" Wolters at the helm.

Deerfield - Shields High School track team set the county afire last Thursday afternoon by blasting out a team championship at Weiss fields, Waukegan. Deerfield won the meet with a total of 57 points, with Libertyville, last year's winners, taking second with 47 points.

It was the fourth time Deerfield Shields has ruled over Lake County cindermen. The Blue and White registered their first win in 1928, again in 1929 and then in 1931. The 1931 meet found many records shattered, featuring such famed stars as Rubly, Fox, Fell, Heine, Benvenuto, Ray, and Fellows.

Three Records Broken Two of the records broken were disposed of by the thin-clads from Libertyville. Brown, a middle distance runner, traveled the 880-yard run in 2:10.3, knocking one tenth of a second off the old mark held by Willard, a brother of the former Fox of Deerfield, since 1931.

Burdock, Grant field star, broke the javelin record to account for the third new mark. Burdock tossed the javelin ten feet further than Steininger of Antioch, tossed it in 1929, the distance being 151 feet 1 inch.

Johnston, High Point Man Parker Johnston, "Deac" Wolters' star fieldman, won individual honors by scoring a first and two seconds by scoring a first and two seconds for a total of 11 points. Parker won the discus throw and took second in the javelin throw and the broad jump.

Deerfield Place in Every Event Coach "Deac" Wolters bright array of runners placed in every event. Although Libertyville won six events to Deerfield's five, "Deac" had more men entered in each event. This advantage gave the Deerfield lads a better chance to score more points.

In the sprints, Allen Hokanson seemed the bright spot. Allen placed second in two of the important sprint races and ran on the winning relay team. Ray Anderson, flashy middle distance runner, placed second to Davern of Waukegan in the 440 yard dash. Cliff Glader put on a surprise show and sprinted home to a third place in the 880 run. Bill Holmes and Don

Julian had things pretty much their own way in the hurdle races. Bill won the 120 yard high hurdles and placed second in the low hurdles. Don won the low hurdles and took a third in the high.

Ambrose Cantagallo ran the best mile that he's run in his whole high school career. Ambrose took a third, but his running brought the most praise from "Deac." Bob Lehr, Ambrose's team mate, finished right behind him.

Deerfield's strongest spot on the team proved to be the field events in which Johnston, Irving, and Brandiniso take part. Parker Johnston, placing in three events, brought the most points home for Deerfield. Park in the one first he got, namely the discus, tossed it 114 feet 6 inches. Brandiniso and Irving were also outstanding each contributing a sufficient number of points to the winnings. Other Deerfield men to place in this meet were Sale, Decker, and Ullman in the track events, and Reichman, Moran, and Riddle in the field events.

Last Saturday Deerfield-Shields added another crop of medals to its collection by scoring 22 points in the district meet held at Northwestern University. The meet was held in Dyche Stadium and was the qualifying meet for the state championship track and field meet to be held at the University of Illinois in the near future.

New Trier High School placed first in this meet rolling up 42 points with Evanston high a close second scoring 39 1/2 points. Oak Park, defending champions, placed third with few of their outstanding performers presenting their usual feats: Deerfield and Proviso tied for fourth place, chalking up 22 points. Deerfield's scoring was again done mostly by Parker Johnston, who placed in two events. The fellows scoring points for Deerfield and who qualified for the state meet are Parker Johnston, discus throw; Tom Irving, shot put; and Bill Holmes in the 120 high hurdles. Parker in throwing the discus tossed it further than he has in his whole life. His toss measured 115 feet 3 3/4 inches, which is quite a throw. Parker also placed in the javelin, but not among the qualifiers. Hokanson and Brandiniso also place but they too were not among the qualifiers.

WAUKEGAN DOWNS DEERFIELD 6-4; GAME CARELESSLY PLAYED

Waukegan's Second Win, Deerfield's Third Loss of the Season

After leading the visitors until the seventh inning, the Deerfield baseball squad dropped its third contest of the season to Waukegan by a 6 to 4 score. The game, which was the one postponed from the previous Friday, was played last Wednesday.

Harry Skidmore, pitching for Deerfield, held the opponents in check without a hit for the first three innings. In the fourth he got by the lead-off man but walked the next two batters. They both scored on hits by Krepas and Butkus. An error filled the bases, but the next two hitters went out on easy hits.

The "Bluebacks" could do nothing for the first four innings off the pitching of Butkus. They got two scattered singles in the second and third innings but in the fifth they broke loose with three runs on hits by Pasquesi, Peterson, and Thompson. Traini walked and Bob Skidmore reached first after he was hit in the back by a pitch. This put Deerfield ahead, a lead that was continued until Waukegan tied it up at three all in their half of the sixth.

Waukegan's lead off man, Stang, singled to start the seventh. He moved up while the next two batters were being disposed of, and, after "Skid" got two strikes on the clean-up man, his brother threw over third base trying to get the runner stealing. This run tied up the score, and the batter walked. Another error and two hits drove in two more runs to give them the winning margin. Deerfield could do nothing in their half of the seventh, although "Kelly" Croke reached first on a single.

THREE TRACK TEAM MEMBERS QUALIFY FOR STATE FINALS

TEAM TIES FOR FOURTH Johnston and Holmes Win Discus Throw and High Hurdles

Placing in five events, six of Deerfield's track and field performers gave the high school 22 points and a tie for fourth place in the district track meet, held at Evanston, Saturday, May 13. Three of the athletes qualified for the state finals to be held at Champaign, Friday and Saturday, May 19 and 20.

Bill Holmes, Park Johnston, and Tom Irving are the three boys who will make bids for championships while representing this school. Bill Holmes won the 120-yard high hurdle race in :16.7 seconds. His most dangerous opponent was Doherty, of Proviso, and he placed after Bill. Park Johnston won the discus throw event with a toss of 115 feet 3 3/4 inches. Art Brandiniso was beaten out by a few inches for second place and a chance to qualify in the state finals.

Tom Irving was in first place until Schuman of New Trier made his last throw and forced Tom into second place, but that still qualified Tom. His throw was 44 feet 11 inches. Allen Hokanson helped to give points toward the total by taking fifth in the 220-yard dash. Park again scored in the javelin throw event when he placed fourth with a throw of 135 feet 6 inches.

The three members of the track team will leave for Champaign in time to be there for the preliminaries which will be held Friday afternoon. Along with the track meet,

there will be a "Big 10" tennis tournament, a baseball game between Michigan and Illinois, and a circus to be held in the armory.

Oak Park was defeated for the first time in three years by New Trier and Evanston, who placed first and second ahead of the ex-champs. Oak Park has held the championship for the past three years.

LAKE COUNTY TRACK TITLE ANNEXED BY SHIELDS TRACK TEAM

LOCALS WIN 880-YD RELAY

Five Firsts Are Gathered By New County Champs

Three cheers for the new track champions of Lake county. This title was won by "Deac" Wolter's stellar performers at Weiss field last Wednesday, May 10. The track and field combination defeated four opposing schools for the victory. The scores were as follows: Deerfield, 59%; Libertyville, 47%; Waukegan, 29; Grant, 12; and Barrington, 6.

Five firsts, seven seconds, four thirds, three fourths, one tie for fourth and first place in the 880-yard relay were more than enough points to take the title. Most of the races were very exciting and close. During the meet three records were broken. Two by Libertyville and one by Grant. V. Willard broke Fox-Tell's record of 4:47 in the mile with the time 4:41.9. C. Brown also of Libertyville broke the 880-yard run by 5 of a second; his time was 2:10.3. Burdock of Grant broke the javelin record of 151 feet with a throw of 162 feet 1 inch.

Amby Cantagallo ran the best

race in his high school career when he placed third in the mile with the time 4:50. Bob Lehr took fourth in this race, to give Deerfield a total of three points. Bill Holmes added more points to the grand total by taking first in the high hurdle race with the good time of :17.6. The county record for this race is :17.3. Wilson of Libertyville placed second in this race, but, due to the fact that he knocked down three hurdles, he was disqualified, and Don Julian was moved up to third place. When the low hurdles were run Don stepped out and took this race by a comfortable margin. Converse of Libertyville also knocked down three too many hurdles and was also disqualified. This gave Bill Holmes second in this race. Don's time was 27.5 against the wind.

Allen Hokenson and Nelson Converse continued their private duel, but this time Allen lost the 100-yard dash by about four inches and this was some race. Allen also suffered defeat at the hands of his enemy in the 220-yard dash by a close margin. Fred Ullman placed fourth in this event. "Tarzan" Andersen and Art Hand of Libertyville continued their duel also; this time "Tarzan" beat his rival but did not win his race. "Tarzan" took a close second in the 440-yard run. Charlie Russell and "Stride" McClary were both sick, so Cliff Glader ran in their place and did a good job of it by taking third in the half-mile race.

Tom Irving "tossed the grapefruit" 43 feet 7 3/4 inches for first place, and Art Brandiniso took second in this event. Art also helped to swell the total with a second in the discus throw and a fourth in the javelin throw. Park Johnston was not only the winner in the discus throw, but also the high point man in the meet with 11 points. Park threw the platter for a distance of

114 feet 6 inches. Park also placed second in the javelin throw, with a toss of 137 feet 10 inches, and second in the broad jump. Bob Riddle placed fourth for Deerfield in the same event.

In the pole-vault Jack Moran tied for fourth, with two other men, and in the high jump Ralph Olson and Dick Reichman tied for fourth place.

When it was time for the 880-yard relay to run, Deerfield had the meet all sewed up, but just to make sure they set out to win this race also. George Salo was the lead-off man and had the bad luck to draw the fifth and outside lane. When he went into the turn he was running third and passed the baton to Bill Decker still in third position. Bill cut in for the pole right away and sped around the south turn in first position. Allen Hokenson was running third man and he picked up a big lead and passed the stick to "Tarzan" Anderson, who, not only kept, but lengthened the lead and crossed the finish line with a ten yard lead. Nineteen medals and one big trophy were the victor's spoils.

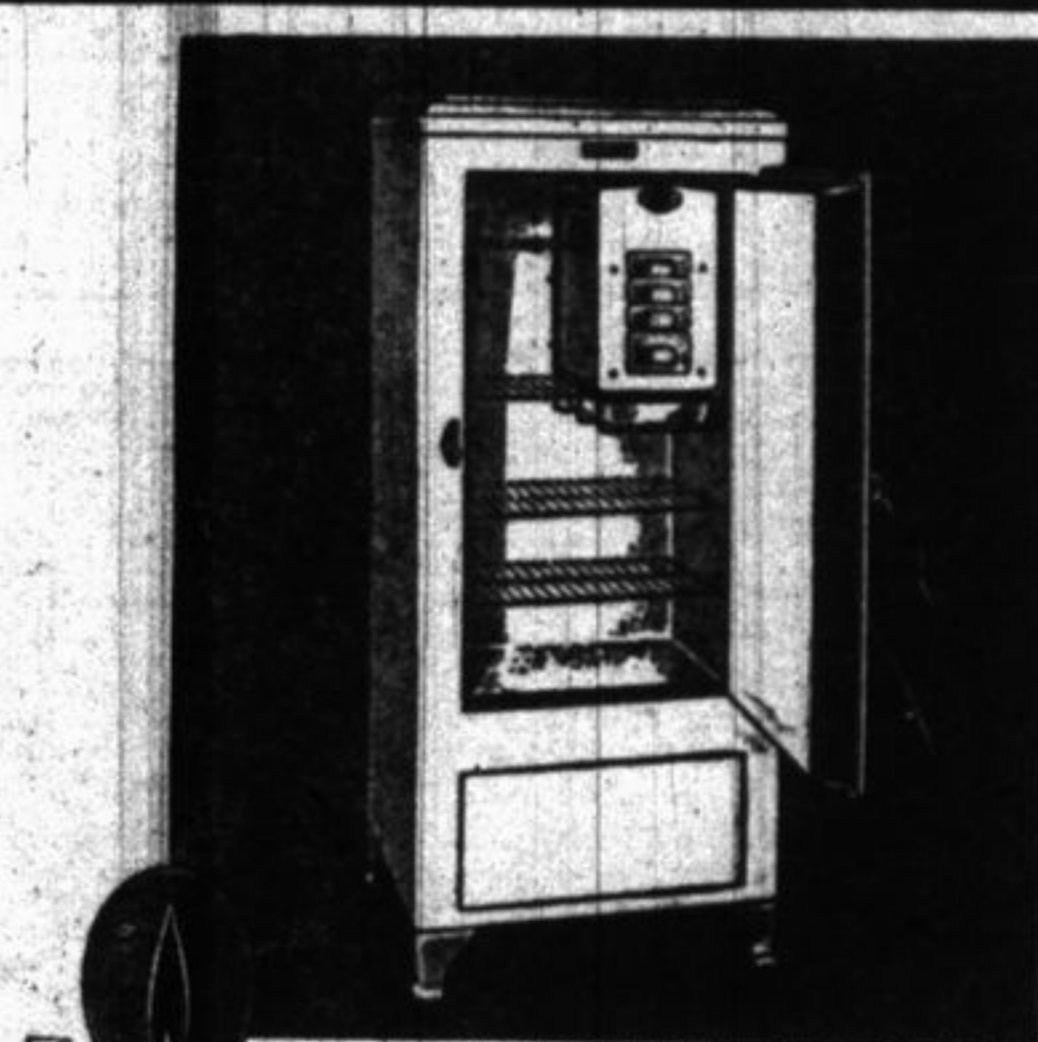
