Florence L. Watkins Dies Here on Tuesday After a Long Illness

Florence Langdon Watkins, younger daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Frederick A. Watkins, of 237 Hazel Avenue, Highland Park, passed away early Tuesday morning at the Highland Park Hospital, after a long illness. Had she lived until June 27, she would have been 22 years old.

Florence was born June 27, 1911, in Highland Park. She attended the Elm Place School in Highland Park, the Country Day School in Winnetka, and was graduated from the Gulf Park Junior College, at Gulfport, Miss., in 1931, receiving the Phi Theta Kappa pin for fine scholarship. That fall she entered the School of Speech at Northwestern University, where she would have been graduated this June had her health permitted. She was a member of Delta Gamma sorority at Northwestern.

She is survived by her parents and a sister, Miss Elsie C. Watkins. Florence was a member of the Presbyterian Church of Highland Park. Her untimely death is mourned by her many friends in this city.

Funeral services will be held at 3 o'clock Wednesday afternoon at the home. The Rev. Louis W. Sherwin, minister of the Highland Park Presbyterian Church, will officiate. Burial will be at Graceland Cemetery.

Catherine Beckman Injured in Auto Accident Friday

Catherine Beckman, the seventeen year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Beckman of Deerfield, was seriously injured Friday evening in an automobile accident, west of Deerfield. Catherine was pinned under the car. Her companion Joseph McCraren, with the aid of Robert Herman removed her from the wreckage and rushed her to the Highland Park Hospital, where X-rays revealed five fractures in the pelvic bones, a broken wrist, internal injuries and a severe leg wound. Catherine, because of her vigorous health and youth has a marvelous chance for recovery. The accident occurred where the Orphans of the Storm Road ends at Duffy Road, about eleven o'clock.

Mosquito Abatement to Be \$1000 Less in Year

In looking over the appropriation ordinance for the Highland Park Mosquito Abatement District for the fiscal year ending May 14, 1934, it may appear to some that the levy has been raised about \$2500, whereas in reality the amount to be spent during the coming fiscal year will be about \$1,000 less than last year. This lowering of the expenses of the district, although its work will be expanded during the year, is possible because the Illinois Emergency Relief Commission will reimburse the district \$3,500 for wages to be advanced to men employed during the year.
