High scoring was the order of the day at Medinah last week. This is not hard to understand when you take in consideration the condition of the course plus the fact that most of the professionals have not had the opportunity to play practice rounds previous to the tournament.

The drive should be the easiest shot to make. Your ball is teed up and you are provided with a perfectly level place to stand. I have always found driving very easy, and so should you. If you will only get away from the idea of a consented hit. Learn to swing through the ball. Much of your driving trouble will then be at an end.

A well known prize fighter once told me that to get the most out of a blow was to first get in hitting position. In golf that would mean to place your weight on the right foot which puts your weight behind the ball, and the club above your shoulder and pushed away from your body. This gives you perfect balance. He then said he did not concentrate on hitting a certain spot, but on punching right through that spot with the weight of his body following the blow. The same thing applies in golf.

You have to get the idea of throwing the clubhead through the ball and letting your weight pivot over from your right foot to the left at the moment of impact. This is what gives you distance. That long drive you once hit was because you had timed your weight transference perfectly.

P. JOHNSTON TAKES FOURTH IN FINALS

"Park" gave Deerfield the two and only points they received in the meet. Freeston, the winner from Atlanta, threw the disk 125 feet 8 inches.

Tom Irving missed out in the qualifying rounds of the shot put by a few scant inches. The winner threw the shot 51 feet 4 inches. Bill Holmes worked his way up to the semi-finals in the 120-yard high hurdles and then was disqualified for knocking over three hurdles. Bill hit the first hurdle and this threw him off his stride. The winners time was :15.8.

During the entire meet, which Rockford won, three records were broken, two in the track events and one in the field events. Lowell Spurgeon, of Centralia, broke the record in the high jump with a leap of 5 feet 5 1/2 inches. The Rideout brothers, from Tuscola, broke the records in the mile and half-mile races. Blaine Rideout ran the mile in 4:25.2, and his brother Wayne ran the half mile in 1:59.4.

Oak Park, past champions for three years, finished third with 12 points, and Proviso, a Suburban league rival, finished second with 16 1/2 points. New Trier, winner of the district meet, finished tenth with 8 1/2 points. Evanston, the other Suburban school, placed after Deerfield with 1 point.

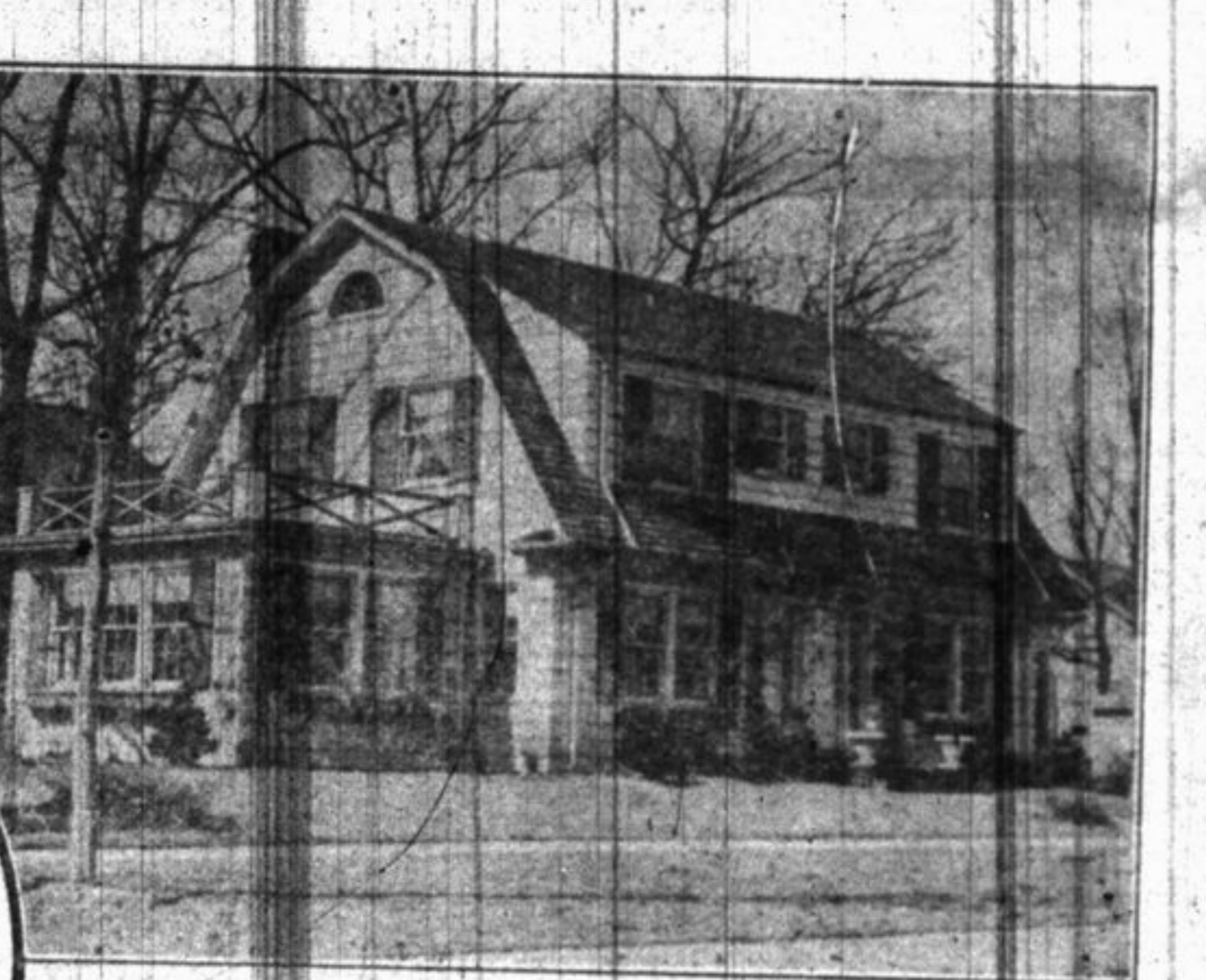
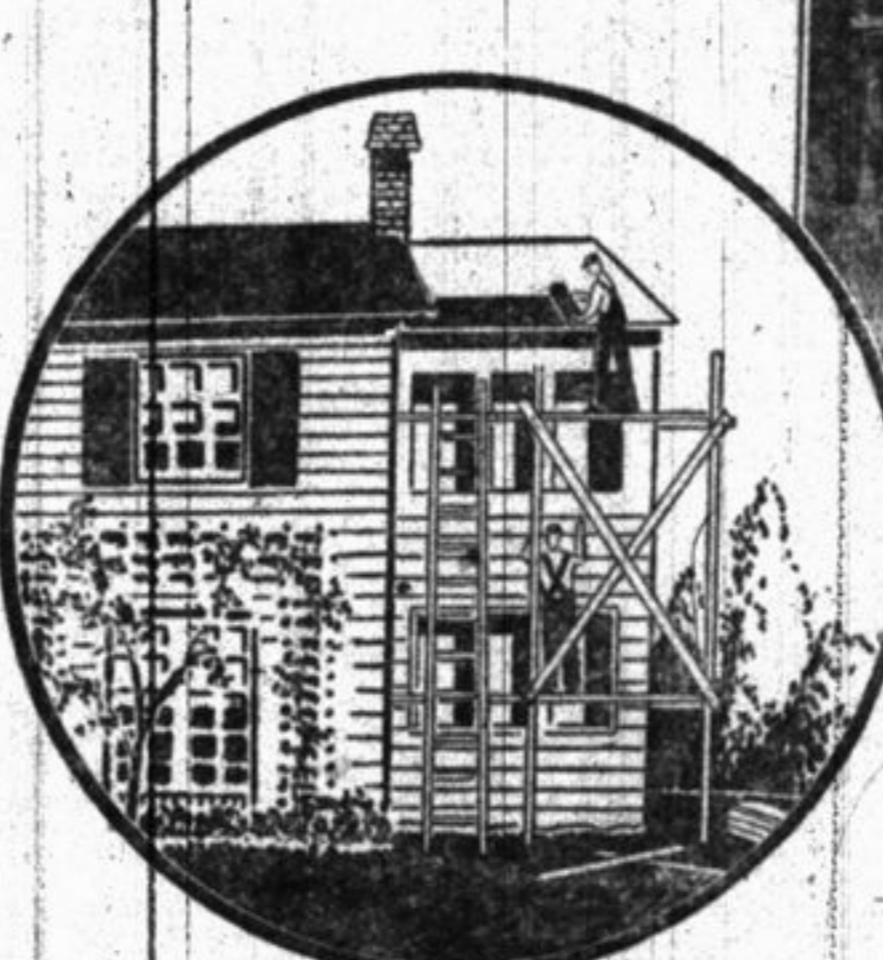
JUNIOR AND SENIOR TRACK TEAMS LOSE TO EVANSTON
