**Melvin Sweetland Dies at U. S. Naval Hospital After a Year's Illness**

Melvin D. Sweetland, son of Mrs. Dale Sweetland of Highland Park, died Wednesday of last week at the U. S. Naval Hospital at Great Lakes, after a year of serious illness. Mr. Sweetland was for several years in the drug business in Highland Park, succeeding in the proprietorship of the Sweetland Pharmacy in 1920 after the death of his



father. He conducted this business successfully until his last illness. He was born in Highland Park Sept. 10, 1888. He was a graduate of Deerfield-Shields High School and the Northwestern University School of Pharmacy. He served 14 months in the World War. Mr. Sweetland was a member of A. O. Fay Lodge No. 676, A. F. and A. M., of Highland Park, and of Dumaresq Spencer Post of the American Legion of this city. Funeral services were in charge of the two organizations Saturday afternoon, the Legion service being held at the home and the Masonic service at the grave at Rose Hill Cemetery.

Mr. Sweetland is survived by his mother and sister, Miss Laura Sweetland.

**Ernst Wilhelm Gieser Dies Early Tuesday Morning at Home**

Ernst Wilhelm Gieser, 72 years old, of 48 North Green Bay Road, Highland Park, died at his home early Tuesday morning after an extended illness. He had lived in Highland Park for more than 40 years, and was well-known here in business circles.

He was born June 17, 1860, in Newweid am Rhine, Germany, the son of Carl Wilhelm and Elisa Gieser. At the age of 20 he came to America and settled in Dover, Ohio. On Sept. 2, 1891, he was united in marriage with Miss Elizabeth Hupprich. Mr. and Mrs. Gieser were the parents of eight children, seven of whom are living.

Besides Mrs. Gieser, he is survived by the following seven children: Carl W. Gieser, of Tecumseh, Neb.; Ernest R. Gieser, of Ames, Iowa; Fred E. Gieser, of Highland Park; Emma and Helen of Highland Park; Margaret of Los Angeles, Calif.; and Mrs. Elsie Tillman of Zeating, Iowa.

Five grandchildren, one brother and one sister, of California, also survive.

Mr. Gieser had been a faithful member of the First United Evangelical Church for about 30 years, and during this time had held official relationship. He was a member of the trustee board and treasurer of the board for about 25 years, which office he held at the time of his death.

Funeral services will be held Thursday afternoon at the First United Evangelical Church at 2 o'clock, with burial at the North Northfield Cemetery.
