\$2500 NORTH SHORE OPEN MEET IS NEXT

Olin Dutra To Defend Title Against Country's Best Golfers Here

(By Warner Turriff)

At daybreak next Sunday morning approximately 200 of the country's leading golfers will meet at the Sunset Valley Golf Club in Highland Park for the beginning of the popular North Shore Open, the important \$2500 tournament of Middle West golfdom. Olin Dutra, California's brawny representative, will be back to defend his last year's title and to face a little more difficult and experienced field than he won over last year.

Jim Foulis, who last week captured the \$5000 St. Paul Open championship with a par-busting total of 283 for the 72 holes, will be a heavy favorite. Jock Hutchison, whom Dutra beat by a stroke last year, is a dangerous contender. Harry Cooper, Walter Hagen, Frank Walsh, Chick Evans and Horton Smith will also be there to cause considerable excitement.

Sonny Rouse, title winner in 1929, Eddie Loos, Sammy Bernardi and Stupples from Exmoor are the local "experts" who are strong threats. Local amateur players entered are Dick Martin, Bill Chambers, Walker Flynn, Art Olson and Bob Cary.

It is said that Rouse has an excellent opportunity to win Al Espinosa as a two-time winner of the event.

The fairways and greens of the course have been put in near perfect shape by the corps of groundkeepers, and will offer the entrants in the Open a real test. Tees have been set back to give added yardage to the eighteen-hole route, and dopsters expect a 36-hole total of 144 to be good for the crown.

Spectators' tickets are on sale at Neild's Sport Shop, Geall's Drug Store, Art Olson and Company and the Highland Park Pharmacy.

The North Shore Open was started at Sunset Valley in 1928. There were 48 entries that year. Last summer there were 200 participants, coming from 11 different states.

The Sunset Valley Golf Club is the property of the East Park District of Highland Park. It is operated under the authority of the park commissioners to promote the best interests of the game for the full enjoyment of golf enthusiasts on the North Shore. The course offers splendid playing facilities.

Woman's Auxiliary of Hospital Is Devoted to Institution's Needs

The life of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Highland Park Hospital is devoted entirely to the needs of the hospital, supplementing in every way possible to activities of the parent organization.

Most important is the social service work, \$1,500 having been spent last year on forty-four persons for hospitalization, special nurses, tests and X-rays.

The Auxiliary milk bill for the undernourished school children in Highland Park and Ravinia totaled \$285.00.

An annual gift of \$300.00 to the dental clinic assisted in carrying on a work greatly increased over last year, 810 treatments being given to school children.

The Auxiliary supports the infant feeding clinic at a cost of approximately \$175 per year. This clinic functions bi-weekly at the hospital. The sewing and surgical dressings committee records an annual contribution to the hospital of several hundred garments and thousands of surgical dressings.

The social service, sewing and surgical dressings activities are outstanding in the Auxiliary work but a Thrift Shop run for charity, and the Memorial and Happy Day fund, which is a generous contributor to the charity income, is a most worthwhile asset to the Auxiliary work.

Miss Mary G. Ewing Is Elected President Of Christian Science Church

Miss Mary G. Ewing, of Brookline, Mass., sister of Miss Ruth Ewing of 541 South St. Johns Avenue, Highland Park, was elected president of The First Church of Christ, Scientist, The Mother Church at Boston, Monday of this week.

Miss Ewing is a daughter of the late Judge and Mrs. William C. Ewing, who lived in Highland Park. She was a native of Quincy, Ill., receiving her schooling in that city and in Chicago. Christian Science was first brought to the attention of her family through the healing of her father.

Her mother, Mrs. Ruth B. Ewing, subsequently became a pupil of Mrs. Mary Baker Eddy, founder of Christian Science, and a teacher of Christian Science.

Miss Ewing first received instruction in Christian Science from her mother, and later in 1910, from the Board of Education of The Massachusetts Metaphysical College in a Normal Class.

The new president, who succeeds Gov. Ralph O. Brewster in that office, served as a second reader of the First Church of Christ, Scientist, in Chicago, of which she is a member. From 1918 to 1926 she was a member of The Christian Science Board of Lectureship of The Mother Church. She retired from that Board to become a trustee of The Christian Science Pleasant View Home and The Christian Science Benevolent Association in Boston, from which position she resigned in 1931 to become a member of the Bible Lessons Committee which prepares the lesson sermons used in the Sunday services of Christian Science churches.

Other important news from the annual meeting of the church in Boston Monday includes the announcement that no further contributions to the fund for the building of the new \$4,000,000 home now being erected for The Christian Science Publishing Society need be made after July 1, as the amount has been subscribed.

BAD STORM STRIKES HERE SUNDAY NIGHT

Lightning Damages Residence, Power Lines; Wind Hits City at 70 Miles

One of the worst electrical and wind storms in years swept the North Shore Sunday night, striking with greatest force at Highland Park, where one dwelling was struck by lightning, an electric transformer was struck by another bolt, light and power lines were blown down, and trees and tree limbs were broken off and damaged.

The storm struck about 9:30 and subsided about 11 o'clock. During the hour and a half, the Highland Park Fire Department was called three times to take charge of emergency situations, and parts of the city were in darkness as light service was interrupted by broken wires.

The home of Charles Rafferty, a member of the Highland Park Police Department, was damaged to the extent of about \$250 when struck by lightning. The bolt toppled over a large chimney, which fell, tearing a hole in the roof, and tore away one corner of the house. Mr. Rafferty was alone at home at the time. He summoned the fire department, which prevented further damage to the house by temporarily patching the hole in the roof. The residence, which is located at 842 North End Court, did not catch on fire.

An electric transformer at the corner of Deerfield Avenue and Ridge Road was struck by lightning, and a high-tension power line at Second Street and Elm Place was blown down. Both emergencies were handled by the fire department and workmen for the Public Service Company of Northern Illinois.

Five big trees in Sunset Park were broken off in the 70-mile gale, and damage was also done in Central Park. The storm followed an extremely hot and "muggy" day. The disturbance struck Highland Park, but missed other North Shore communities, which experienced some rain and wind, but not the destruction which was left in the wake of the storm here.

DEERFIELD TOWNSHIP VOTES WET MONDAY

Two Republican Circuit Judge Candidates, Democratic Entry Winners Here

Deerfield Township voted overwhelmingly wet in Monday's election, when the State of Illinois voted four to one to repeal the Eighteenth Amendment. The vote in this township was 1897 for repeal and 275 against. The vote in Lake County was 14,114 for repeal and 3819 against.

Deerfield Township voted for two of the Republican circuit judge candidates and the lone Democratic candidate. The total vote in the township for the four candidates was as follows: For Judge Ralph R. Dady, 1417; for Judge Arthur E. Fisher, 1088; for Judge Edward D. Shurtleff, 866; and for Charles E. Carpenter, the Democratic candidate, 1077. The three Republican judges were re-elected in the district, although the Lake County vote placed Judge Dady first with a total of 12,468, Mr. Carpenter second with a total of 9382, Judge Fisher third with 8551 votes, and Judge Shurtleff fourth with 7738 votes.

Tennis Exhibition Will Be Given At Deerfield-Shields Courts Sunday

In response to the demands of the many local tennis fans playing on the courts of the new Deerfield-Shields Athletic field an announcement has been received that the internationally famous tennis star, Mr. Bloomstrand, will give an exhibition match at the high school courts next Sunday afternoon at 2 o'clock.

Mr. Bloomstrand is the former intercollegiate champion of Gothenberg, Sweden, and holds many championship records in the United States. There will be no charge for this exhibition and the public is cordially invited to attend.

This exhibition, incidentally, is being promoted in line with the all-year-round intramural athletic program at the high school. The sports program at the athletic field this summer is under the direction of J. D. Floyd and a number of interesting events are planned. A baseball league for high school students is being organized and plans are being made for a track meet to be held the latter part of July.

Plans are also being made for the second annual North Shore Tennis Tournament to start about July 15. So that the older as well as the young patrons will have an equal opportunity to participate, there will be contests for both juniors (over 18 years and under) and seniors (over 18 years). Anyone residing on the north shore, Evanston to Waukegan inclusive, is eligible for entrance.

Many well known sports authorities have expressed their contention that the courts are the finest and best kept up in this territory. They are located on West Park Avenue, three blocks west of Green Bay Road. The courts are free to the use of Deerfield-Shields High School students, but a nominal fee is charged to others which goes for the upkeep and care of the courts as well as for promotional expenses for the continuation of the summer intramural athletic program.
