At the forum at the Highwood Methodist Church held on Friday, May 26, the Rev. Mr. Colling of Gurnee, who was a delegate to the Third Continental Congress recently held in Washington, D. C., spoke of his impressions of the congress.

This Third Continental Congress was called to organize the liberty-loving people of the country that they might put into practice the principles of government proclaimed in the Declaration of Independence, as these principles are not practiced today. It is a recurrence of the dissatisfaction felt by our forefathers in 1775.

More than 4,000 delegates attended, gray-haired veterans, middle-aged men and youths, from all sections of the country. The Rev. Mr. Colling said that these men knew well the task they faced and were keenly alive to their responsibilities in a new "Army of Emancipation" for the suffering millions.
