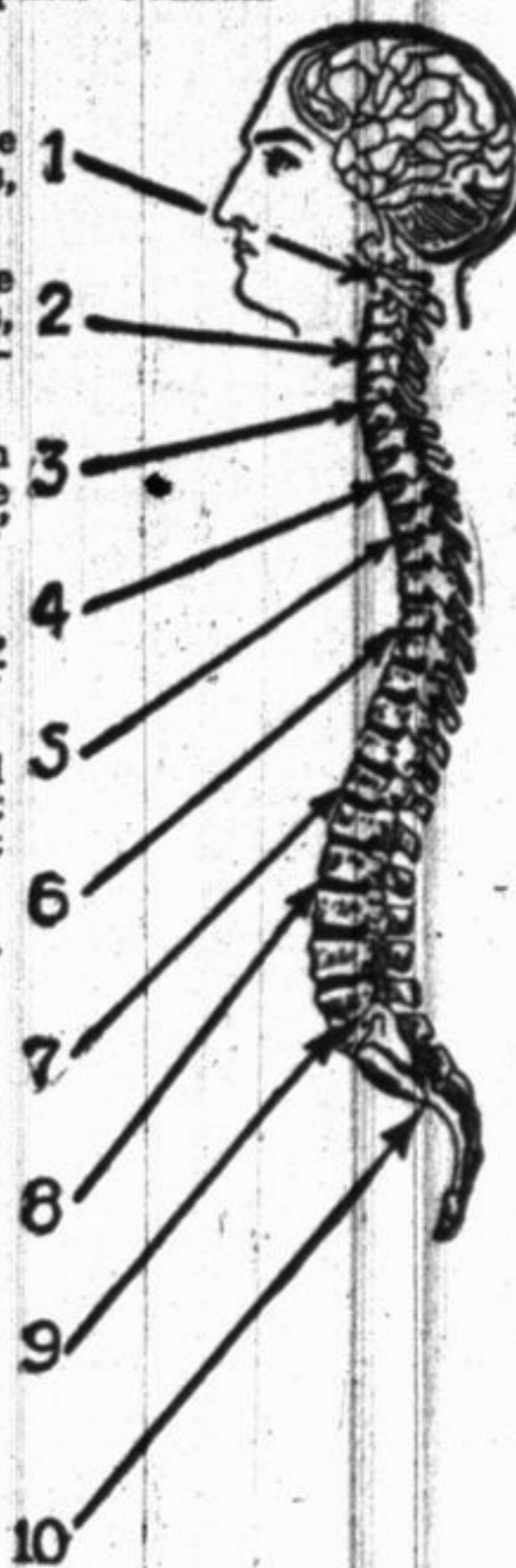
## Miss Biederstadt's Pupils Present Fine Recital June 3
