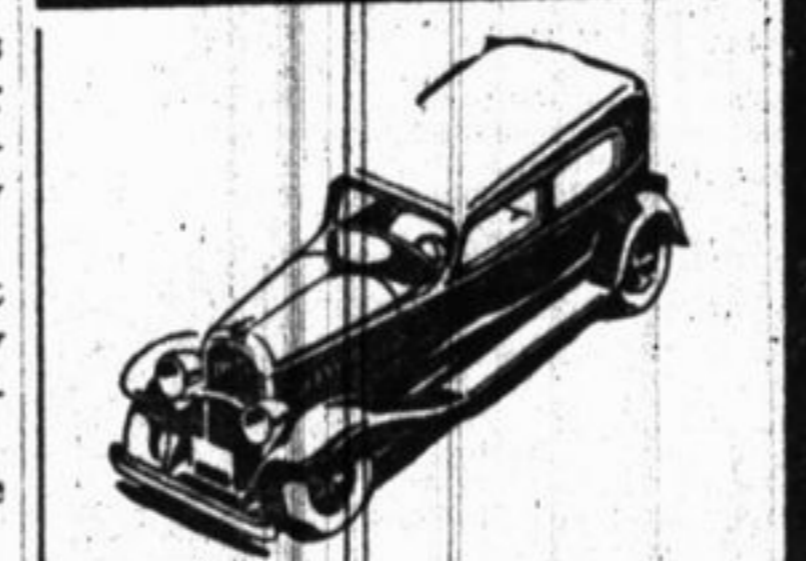

Mrs. Walter Sorenson and daughter Marilyn of Chicago were overnight guests Friday at the Bruce Blaine home.

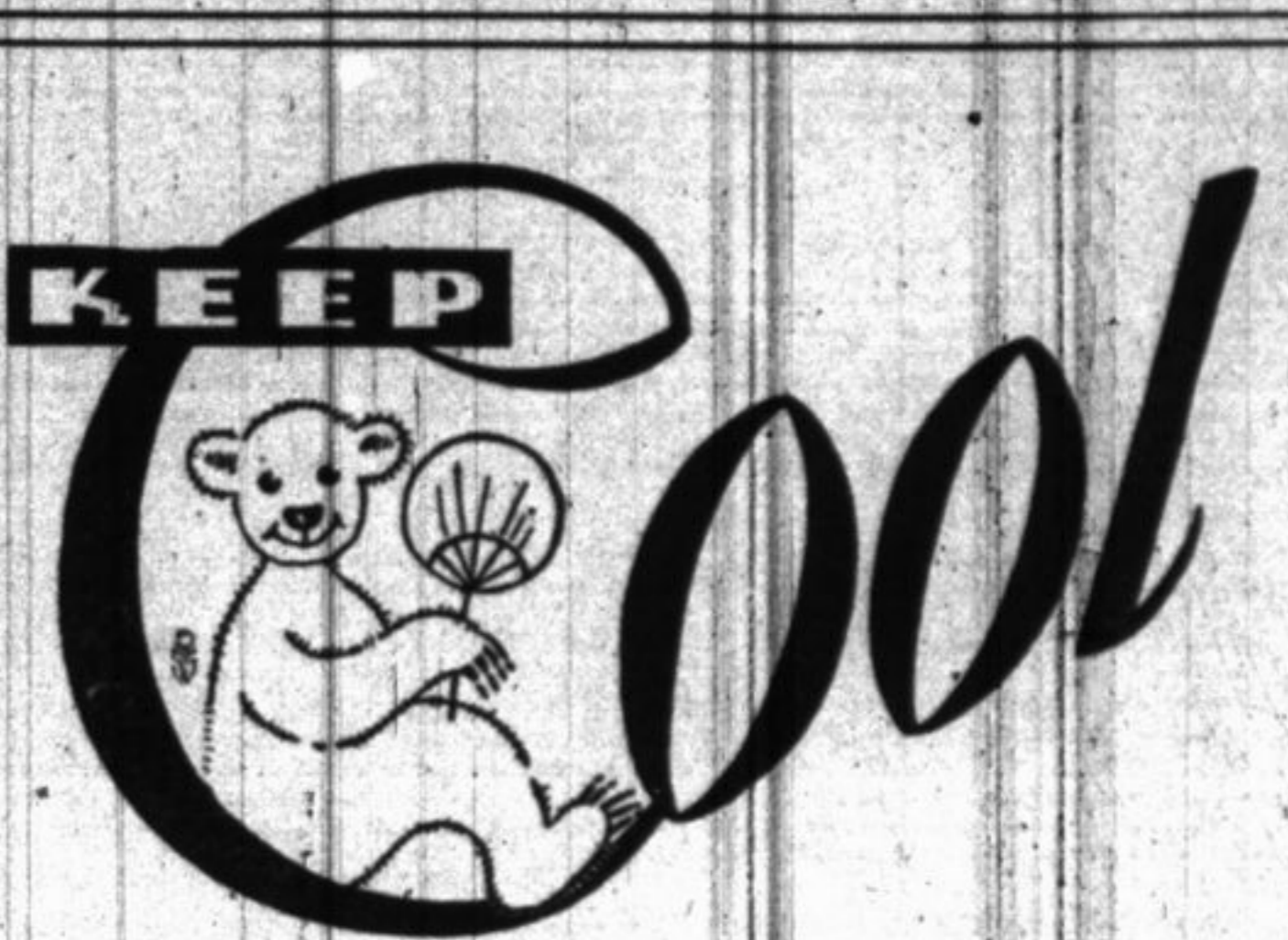
