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LEGISLATURE MAY BURY SCHOOL BILL

State Assembly Expected To Adjourn Without Passing Lake Forest Measure

There is a little possibility that the bill which would enable the city of Lake Forest to withdraw from the Deerfield-Shields Township High School district, will be passed in this session of the state legislature. The fifty-eighth general assembly of Illinois will have closed within a few days, and sponsors of the withdrawn bill doubt seriously if it will be passed in the last-minute rush of measures by the legislature.

"Given more than 2000 bills on which to work, the total accomplishment has been exceedingly poor," says Guy Housley in a Springfield dispatch in Monday evening's Chicago Daily News. Mr. Housley records that 2084 bills have been introduced in this session, only 109 have been passed, 6 of which have been vetoed by the governor, 106 becoming law, and 87 awaiting the governor's veto or signature.

"This lack of accomplishment, in face of one of the nation's gravest crises, is astounding even to the members of the two houses," Mr. Housley says. "The whole session has been one of lilly-lallying and horse-swapping."

"The governor has been pushing his program; the legislators have been pushing the governor for jobs and favors—and the public has been left waiting for helpful and remedial legislation."

"Armed with a program conspicuous for its wholesome possibilities, Gov. Horner after his inauguration undertook to drive the legislature. His success has been only partial, approximately 30 percent."

"So urgent were many of the bills thrown into the hopper that fully a quarter of them carried emergency clauses. But as the legislature has drawn near its end the clauses have been stricken with hope of final passage by a minimum of votes."

"Most of the 2084 measures introduced, of course, had to do with local conditions. The session, in fact, has been fraught with useless activity and of the bills actually passed only a score are of actual benefit to the state at large."

Backers of Lake Forest's plan to withdraw from the high school district and build a school of its own, have circulated a petition during the past week, soliciting support in the move for a bond issue to build the proposed new school. The petition, which now contains hundreds of signatures, reads as follows:

"We the undersigned, legal voters of Lake Forest, hereby pledge a vote for a bond issue to build a complete and adequate high school for the city of Lake Forest, providing a bill is passed by the Illinois State Legislature, enabling the city to withdraw from the Deerfield-Shields High School district."

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
