

### June Championships Under Way At the Sunset Valley Course

In Class B, Mowbray and De Stadler have won the right to meet in the final. Mowbray scored victories over Gompie and Hoes while De Stadler eliminated Peter Prato Jr. and H. C. Erie to reach the championship match.

Raney and Petz were victorious in Class C matches against Matt Gordon and P. M. Prato, respectively. The winner of the McCullough-Randall match will meet Raney in the semi-final, while Petz will struggle with C. L. Jordan, who won by default from G. Forgie.

The Prato and Osborne were noticed practicing up for the Pathway and Sun events.

The results of this practice match could not be obtained but the experts favored the Prato team.

Billy Chambers, who won the amateur title at the North Shore Open, is playing at Medinah this week in the state amateur meet. "Pat" is playing his best golf now and may meet the top at the tough Medinah course.

### Fort Sheridan Largest "Reforestation Army" Camp in Middle West

Brig. Gen. Frank Parker, commanding the Sixth Army Corps Area, has announced that the full complement of men enrolled for the Civilian Conservation Corps in Illinois are better in conditioning or in work camps on June 7, an official report of the President.

The Fort Sheridan training unit had 3,128 men on June 21 and was the largest camp in four mid-west states.

Brig. Gen. Frank C. Bolles, commanding at Fort Sheridan, announced last week that a number of additional companies had been sent to work camps in the corps area.

Five companies of Wisconsin men recently left Fort Sheridan for work camps.

As the last of the forest army recruits were starting to leave for the work in the forests, plans were being made throughout the mid-west to open the summer Citizens Military Training Corps camps, one of the largest of which is located each year at Fort Sheridan.

### Mr. Speer Appointed To Methodist Commission

C. T. Speer, 21 North Sheridan Road, Highland Park, has been appointed by Bishop Ernest Lynn Walker of the Chicago Area of the Methodist Episcopal Church to its recently created commission on the Christian Home. Mr. Speer is a member-at-large of the commission. He will also serve on the committee on home upgraders and home builders.

About 200 Methodists met and women have been appointed to this commission. Most of them are residents of Illinois, but a few Methodists from Iowa, Minnesota and New York have been appointed.

The commission has been subdivided by Bishop Walker into three committees, each of which will conduct intensive research into one phase of the problem. One will investigate the facts as to the status of the home in the United States.

A second will make a study of forces which build the home and those which destroy it. A third will consider the relations of the home to such institutional forces in America as the schools, the parent-teacher associations and the church itself.

Special attention will be given to methods of inducing middle families to restore the family now.

### Barnesburgh School Graduates Four Pupils

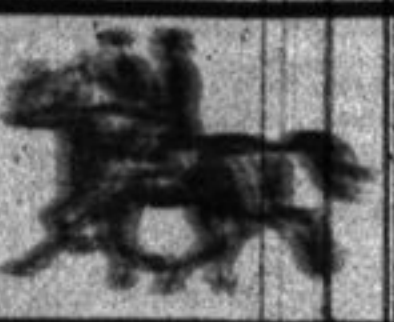
