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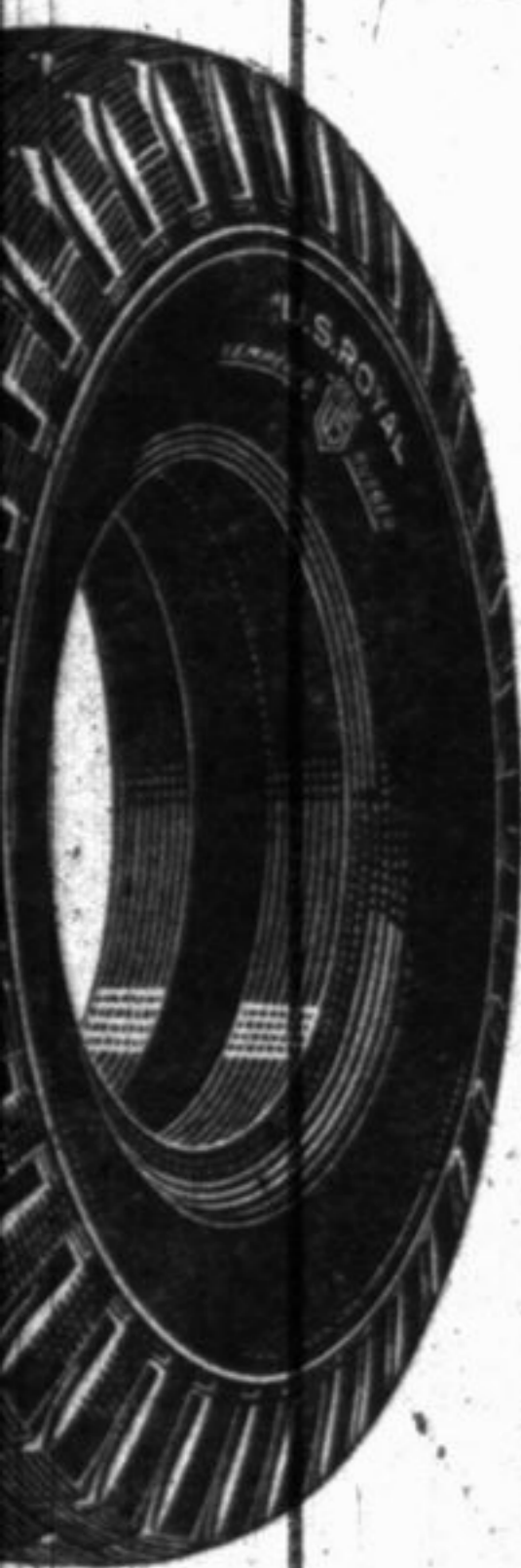

Capt. Woodbridge Cary Dies June 17 in Chicago

The many friends of Capt. Woodbridge George Cary will be sorry to hear of his death on June 17 in Chicago. The funeral services were held on June 20 at 1732 Wilson avenue and were conducted by the Sons of the American Revolution. Interment was at Rose Hill.

Captain Cary was born in Clayton, N.Y., Sept. 21, 1844. From the time he was a young boy he sailed with his father, Capt. William Cary, every summer while his winters were spent away at school. In early manhood the family moved to Benton Harbor, Mich., and for many years he sailed out of that port. Undoubtedly Captain Cary was one of the last of the real old-time Great Lakes sailors.

During the Klondike gold rush he took his own boat, the "Dusty Diamond," to Alaskan waters and carried freight and passengers on the Behring Sea and Yukon River. He spent about eight years in Alaska and then settled in Chicago. The later years of his life were spent in Highland Park in connection with the North Shore Trust Company.

Captain Cary leaves two sisters, Mrs. H. L. Pitcher and Mrs. George R. Wright, now of Saugatuck, Mich., a brother, Clarence Cary of Chicago, and a daughter, Mrs. J. H. Ressler of Detroit.
