



Captain Cary was born in Clayton, N.Y., Sept. 21, 1844. From the time he was a young boy he sailed with his father, Capt. William Cary, every summer while his winters were spent away at school. In early, manhood the family moved to Benton Harbor, Mich., and for many years he sailed out of that port. Undoubtedly Captain Cary was one of the last of the real old-time Great Lakes sailors.

During the Klondike gold rush he took his own boat, the "Dusty Diamond," to Alaskan waters and carried frieght and passengers on the Behring Sea and Yukon River. Hespent about eight years in Alaska and then settled in Chicago. The later years of his life were spent in Highland Park in connection with the North Shore Trust Company.
