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NEW HIGHLAND PARK SERVICE STATION TO OPEN

Mrs. Ella C. Evans, 71, Who Died on April 2, Lived Here 60 Years

Mrs. Ella C. Evans, of whose death brief mention was made in the last issue, was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Martin Ceperley. She was born in Northfield, Oct. 29, 1861, and died Sunday morning, April 2, 1933, following an acute illness of several weeks.

Mrs. Evans' father volunteered early in the Civil war and remained in the service until his death from disease in camp before Vicksburg. The widow married George Elvey and following the war located at Clifton, Ill. In 1873 Mr. and Mrs. Elvey with their young daughter Ella located in Highland Park, on South Green Bay Road, on the same corner where Mrs. Evans' two sisters still reside. Thus it will be seen that Mrs. Evans entire life has been spent in Illinois and sixty years of it in Highland Park. Her early education was in the old Elm Place School.

Ella Ceperley became the wife of Robert G. Evans July 26, 1881. He was at that time a young merchant on Central Avenue, between First and Second Streets. He will be remembered by many as a successful merchant, brick manufacturer, and public spirited citizen who served his fellow citizens several times as member of the school board, as alderman in the city council and five terms as mayor of Highland Park. Mr. Evans predeceased Mrs. Evans into the great beyond about three years, having died in December, 1929. Four children were born to this union, all of whom are living, Mrs. Florence M. Stevens, Elmer R. Evans, Mrs. Emma Myers, and Mrs. Harold O. Larsen.

In this family circle were also Arthur E. Evans and Herbert F. Evans, orphaned sons of the late Robert G. Evans, who were mothered from infancy and early childhood by this devoted mother.

Two sisters survive, Miss Lulu Elvey and Mrs. Grace Hoyt of South Green Bay Road, also five grand children, Mrs. Frank Watt, Robert G. Evans, E. Norman Evans, Harold F. Evans, Doris M. Larsen; and one great-grand child, Jean Watt.

All were present at the funeral which was conducted at the home on South First Avenue by the Rev. F. Brandfellner last Wednesday afternoon at 2 o'clock. Burial was at Lake Forest.

Mrs. Evans, because of poor health through many years, was largely confined to her home and immediate environs. She was devoted to her children and faithful to her friends, a quiet Christian with her Bible frequently open in her hands. Her passing will be mourned by many friends.
