PUBLIC FUNDS MAY BUILD HIGH SCHOOL AT LAKE FOREST

U. S. To Be Asked For To Construct A Forest Building

Petitions are being circulated at Lake Forest, Highwood, Deerfield, and signed by voters of the Board of Education of Shields High School to motion to the Federal Administration of Public Works at Washington with which to build a school at Lake Forest as the Deerfield-Shields system fund is created to give under the provision of the Industrial Recovery Act.
The petitions read as follows: "The undersigned citizens of Deerfield-Shields Township School District hereby state the fact that a high school at Lake Forest constructed under divisions of the National Industrial Recovery Act is acceptable to a majority of the citizens residing in Deerfield-Shields Township High School District, and designed affirm that the act will give immediate relief to many men in this region who are at present unemployed, respectfully petition you to make application to the District Administrator of the Federal Emergency Administration of Public Works for funds for this school to be authorized by an election on July 22, 1934."
