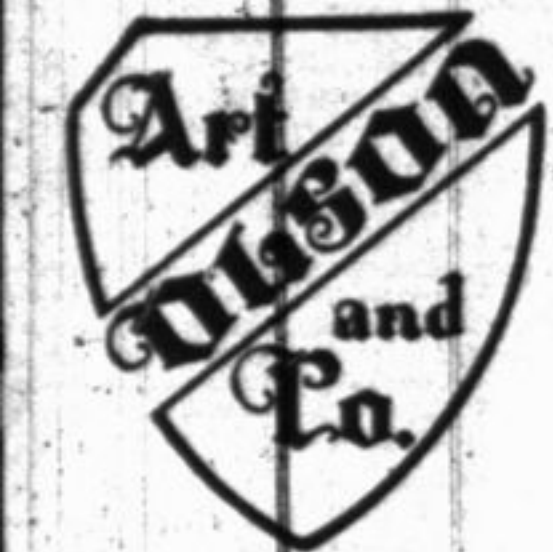

PUBLIC FUNDS MAY BUILD HIGH SCHOOL

(Continued from page 1)vides that thirty per cent of this loan is remitted by the government, never to be repaid. It is confidentially stated by some that fifty per cent will never be called for. The balance carries four per cent interest for thirty years.

"A large number of calls upon this fund have already been made from various parts of the country. Since recovery is clearly on the way, there is need for immediate application for the proposed school project. It is only a matter of a few years when additional building will be required, depression or no depression. The Lake Forest building will relieve congestion. Considering the large amount of the total tax that Lake Forest pays, Lake Forest is certainly entitled to this next improvement," says an official of the school.

In 1908, when the south half of Shields Township joined the high school district by concurrent vote of citizens of the two townships, the northern half of Lake Forest, containing the business district and the region east to Lake Michigan containing about two square miles, became a part of the high school district. Lake Forest has in recent years enlarged its boundaries to include all that part of Shields Township which lies in the high school district and a considerable part of Deerfield Township, in all over thirteen square miles.

"The loss of this great area through division and separation would greatly cripple the existing school and add considerably to the school tax," say school officials.

"The question is asked how much will the new high school at Lake Forest add to the present cost? It will add something, of course, though not much in comparison to the cost if the district were divided. The teachers will be taken from the present school. Nothing will be added to the cost of administration. Heat, light, and janitor service for the new school will add approximately \$14,000 per year. On the other hand, there will be a saving of \$5,000 a year now spent in transporting students from Lake Forest to Highland Park. As for the debt service, the year 1934 will see bonded indebtedness on four of the present high school buildings paid in full, leaving only \$110,000 to be paid on the auditorium. Thus the new indebtedness incurred for the Lake Forest High School will not be felt, as it will take the place of bonds and interest hitherto paid on Highland Park buildings. The federal government will call for only four per cent interest. The amount which must be borrowed from the federal government will not be excessive. The school now has a cash surplus of \$117,000 on hand, not counting money still in closed banks and tuition still due from the Non-High School Districts of Lake and Cook Counties.

"The government desires each community that has future projects of construction to build now, so that we may give honorable employment, and give aid in industrial recovery. A meeting of representative citizens from different parts of the district was held on Wednesday evening, July 12, at the high school. The project was then endorsed and the Board was asked to file a formal application for funds. The petitions signed by citizens are a necessary part of the procedure, since the Federal Administration of Public Works must be assured that the project is locally desired and acceptable.

"The Lake Forest High School will be nearer the homes where parents can keep in closer touch with their children. The school will provide a community center. Use of the auditorium, gymnasium and swimming pool will not be confined to students alone, but will be shared with the whole community. The teachers will live in Lake Forest and contribute socially and economically to the city. Merchants and mechanics will benefit from the local expenditure of school money. A local high school will also enhance real estate values as a good school always tends to attract new residents to suburbs.

One hundred children from the East Park Board playgrounds in Highland Park were the guests of the Chicago Cubs baseball game on Tuesday afternoon in Chicago at the Cubs park, and witnessed the game between the Chicago team and the Boston Braves. The children were given a special invitation to the game by President Vecek of the Cubs, and transportation in the form of a special train was furnished by the North Shore Line, arranged by Mr. Eubanks.

Howard Copp, playground director, accompanied the children to the game. On Thursday, July 27, Louis Comiskey, president of the Chicago White Sox, has invited the local children to see the game between the Sox and Cleveland.

Raymond Bock Has An Operation To His Arm

Raymond Bock of 13 South Second Street, who underwent a serious operation to his left arm at the Highland Park Hospital Thursday of last week, is recovering nicely. Mr. Bock was injured in an automobile accident west of North Chicago about two weeks ago, and the arm had healed before it was discovered that there was an internal injury which required the operation.

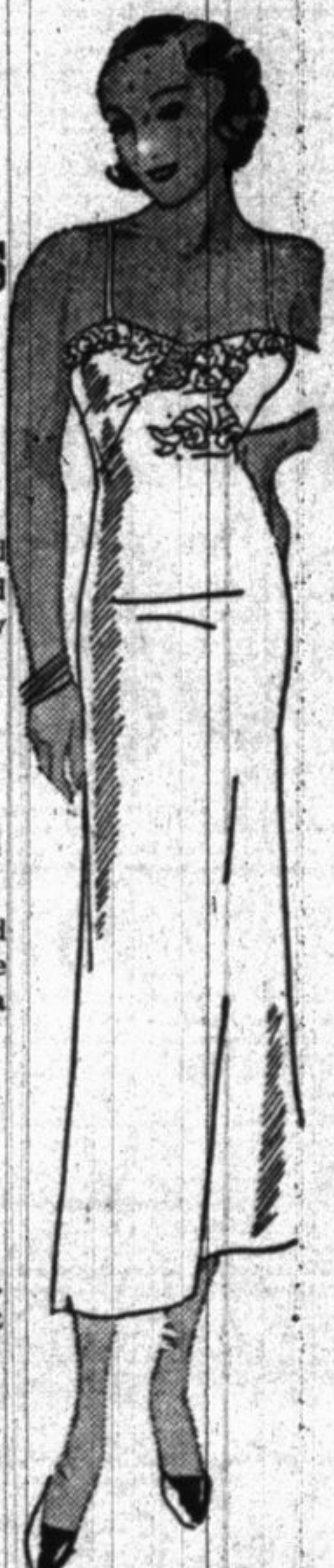
