## Congressman James Simpson To Explain Legislation Of U. S.

"Having found it impossible to have personal contact with any appreciable proportion of my 580,000 constituents, I am going to write a short article from time to time on the major legislative enactments of the 73rd congress attempting to explain the apparent reactions to the policies involved. I shall endeavor to be impartial regardless of how my own vote was cast," says Congressman James Simpson, Jr., of the Tenth District of Illinois.

"I feel in the position of a steward reporting to my employers, and it is through the courtesy of the press that I am afforded this opportunity, and I want to publicly express my appreciation for this privilege here.

"During the last session we have in many instances embarked, as far as the United States is concerned, upon uncharted seas, through control of demands for honesty, both apparent and inherent in our banks, as well as attempting to rejuvenate a sick industry in the form of huge public expenditures. Whether this form of government can exist with this new conception of the function of a federal government, which is to control practically everything instead of getting the government out of business, remains to be seen, and I know of no subject that can be nearer to heart or mind of the American people.

"I feel that the next ninety days are the most important in the history of America, and while some of these new policies are already in operation, my views will be those that were gained during the enactment of the various laws, and as such will, I hope, be of interest to readers."

## North Shore Cleaners Attend State Meeting

The Illinois Association of Dyers and Cleaners held their annual convention July 16, 17 and 18 at the Stevens Hotel in Chicago for the purpose of adopting a state code, regulating standard minimum wages and maximum working hours to be approved under the national industrial recovery act.

Reported to be included in the code was a 44-hour week throughout the state and a minimum wage based upon living conditions in the different districts. In order to prevent an excess of cleaning and dyeing establishments, it was explained, a resolution was adopted limiting the opening and remodeling of stores and plants due to existing concerns working to about thirty per cent of their capacity.

Gerald Parker was appointed as chairman of the nominating committee, and L. B. Keeler and Otto F. Fisher were elected to the board of the Illinois state association.

They are like no other racial group in all the team East. The rings, soldered upon their necks are constantly superimposed from infancy until maturity; until these sleeved beauties resemble nothing so much as the giraffe.

## 80 Soldiers Ready For The Italian Air Armada

A detachment of 80 soldiers from Fort Sheridan was encamped at Lake Geneva, Wis., last Saturday to assist the possible landing there of the Italian air armada, led by Gen. Italo Balbo, in case that had been necessary.

Lake Geneva, just a few miles over the Illinois-Wisconsin line, had been designated as an emergency landing in case Lake Michigan had been too rough for the 24 planes which arrived on their 6100-mile hop from Italy to the World's Fair last Saturday. The Fort Sheridan men were detailed to help with the landing and to guard the huge seaplanes in case they were forced to stay at Lake Geneva.
