Gas Company Official Tells About The Daily Heat Content Tests

"During the past few weeks while the government industrial commissions have been proposing new regulatory measures, a great many people have expressed the opinion that such action is revolutionary and wholly beyond any previous scope of government. People with such impressions would probably be surprised to learn that in some industries very similar measures have been in force for years. And just as the new proposals are designed to benefit the country as a whole, so were these present measures intended to protect the public from certain evils that invariably resulted from uncontrolled competition," says the local manager of the North Shore Gas Company.

"Probably the most familiar example of an industrial code that has been given the test of time can be found in the gas industry. The North Shore Gas Company is governed by a code promulgated by the Illinois Commerce Commission which contains many features similar to the new Federal codes and which sets exceptionally rigid standards for all departments of its service. The section of this code that is apt to be of the greatest interest to most citizens is the standardization of the heat content of the gas.

"The apparatus used for determining the heat content is called a calorimeter. The principle of the calorimeter is the same as in heating a pan of water and measuring its increase in temperature. With the calorimeter, however, all of the variable factors are also measured, such as the barometric pressure, room temperature, exhaust gas temperature, gas volume, and weight of water.

"By law, gas delivered at low pressure must never drop more than 35 B.T.U. below the standard at any one time and its average heat content must equal the standard. Only 10 B.T.U. variation is allowed for high pressure gas. In looking over the records of the North Shore Gas Company which are inspected by the commission, no instances are found where the gas drops below the maximum value, and the average heat content is considerably above that required by the commission.

"Although only one test is required per day for high pressure gas and for low pressure gas, as many as ten are frequently made at the plant in addition to three others made daily at other points in the territory served."
