**North Shore Cleaners File Code With N.R.A.**

The Master Cleaners & Dyers Association of the North Shore held a special meeting July 24 at Week's Dining Room in Wilmette. For the convenience of the members a radio was installed in the private dining room to give the members an opportunity of listening to President Roosevelt's detailed speech, and the interest centered itself on the Industrial Recovery Act.

The association passed a resolution and sent a telegram to Washington, D.C., assuring the administration of its support to the program as outlined in the maximum working hour and minimum wage scale.

This organization wishes to call the attention of the public to the so-called "specials" or twenty-four hour service that they have been rendering prior to this time. They will no longer be able to do this, only in cases of necessity or emergency.

All indications point that dry cleaning charges will advance in the near future to take care of the increased cost of operation and labor under the new schedule. All members, who have signed the voluntary agreement, will display NRA badges and posters in plants, retail outlets and on trucks, and urge the public to join them in the fight against depression, to relieve unemployment, and re-establish purchasing power.

C. and N.W. Seeking A \$3,862,000 R.F.C. Loan

The Chicago and North Western Railway is seeking a loan of \$3,862,000 from the Reconstruction Finance Corporation to assist in the refinancing of an underlying bond maturity. The road has asked the Interstate Commerce Commission for approval of the loan, which will bring R.F.C. advances to the road to \$35,000,000.

In the meantime, earnings of the road continue to improve coincident with a sharp increase in car loadings. For June the road had a net operating income of more than \$1,000,000—the largest since October, 1932. This figure compares with an operating deficit of \$173,234 in June 1932, and with an operating income of \$173,424 in May, 1933.
